Thanksgiving

THANKSGIVING is with us. The day when families get together and really enjoy each other; the day when, whether we think of it or not, we observe with elaborate dinners bearing characteristic dishes from the early life of the New England forefathers, the solemn ritual of those early fathers who hoped for plenty amongst the hardest kind of surroundings.

Those days of wilderness and crude social life seem incredible to the modern Americans, but one thing the modern has in common with those sturdy old Pilgrims—modern man still likes to meet together and enjoy food and the company of his fellow mankind. Thanksgiving day is a marvelous excuse for this social instinct to be gratified.

A brief history of the growth of Thanksgiving is interesting. The Pilgrims first set apart a day for this purpose after their first harvest in 1621. Although Thanksgiving is generally thought of as a national holiday of long standing, it was for a long time only an occasional local observance. The Massachusetts Bay Colony observed it for the first time in 1630 and frequently thereafter until about 1680 when it became annual. In Connecticut it was celebrated first in 1639 and annually after 1647. The Dutch in New Netherland appointed a day for Thanksgiving in 1644 and occasionally thereafter.

During the Revolutionary War the Continental Congress appointed one or more days of thanksgiving each year but 1777, and after the war President Washington designated a day in 1789 and another six years later. Again at the close of the war in 1812, President Madison in response to a resolution of Congress, set apart a day for thanksgiving. By 1858 proclamations appointing a day of thanks were issued by governors of twenty-five states and two territories. Then in November, 1864, President Lincoln appointed the last Thursday of November, and each president since has followed his example.

What Paris is Wearing

PARIS—Paris keeps most of its decorations except on sports occasions well away from the center-front this year. The newest jeweled buckle is worn not only away from the front, but far enough to the side to earn for itself the name of the new "side-arm" buckle.

The under-arm buckle differs from those not only in its position but in form as well. In order to be well in evidence it must be long enough so that both ends are visible front and back of the arm when it is at rest. It measures 4 inches in length so that it adorns both the front and back of the dress.

Paris prefers the under-arm buckle which is flexible so that it fits well the contours of the body. It is usually made in three-link, the flexible device being concealed some way in the design, as the one in the sketch shows.

Vicmet uses this buckle and other versions of it in numerous ways. Very often it is attached to the wide belt of a crepe roma dress, so that the buckle catches the material and pulls it down to a narrow width, via a number of small, soft folds.
