

STOCKS HEAVY AFTER HOLIDAY

Rails Suffer Most but net Decline not Great; Late Covering Helps

NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Lower prices prevailed in security and commodity markets today. Stocks were heavy in sleepy post-holiday trading, rails suffered most, but the average net decline for the three major groups was less than two points in a turnover of 1,743,790 shares. Late covering saved prices from closing on the bottom.

Railroad bonds followed the stocks lower, and there was little vitality in any part of that market except United States governments which held firm. Wheat and corn sagged, while cotton futures closed 50 to 60 cents a bale lower.

Utilities and oils reacted with the rails, although not so extensively. Industrial leaders, at the day's lowest prices, were off one to three points, but part of those declines was recovered in the last half hour, several carrier shares skidded into new low ground. Union Pacific, off more than 5 at one time, closed 2 lower, and New York Central retrieved a point of a break of 3 1/2.

Net losses in the industrial stocks exceeded a couple of points in only a few instances. U. S. Steel, American Can, Bethlehem steel, Case, Du Pont, General Electric, Radio and Westinghouse were off 1 to 2 at the close.

Easiness on wheat, which sagged slightly more than a cent, was ascribed to weakness in Winnipeg and bearish Kansas reports. Corn dropped 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 cents on increased receipts and larger Argentine exports.

Foreign exchanges were largely heavy, but dull. The Canadian dollar receded from the levels which recently sent gold to Montreal. Sterling and the French franc were steady.

ences and several minor negotiations had been in progress throughout the day in an endeavor to bring together employees and men.

Before both a conference of miners' delegates and a conference of South Wales employers and men were proposals from the mine owners "spreadover" system of hours should be adopted from Monday next when the new coal mines' act becomes effective.

In each case the proposal was flatly rejected and at the delegates' conference a recommendation was passed that stoppage of work in any one district should be converted into a national strike to include all other areas.

Under the spreadover system the owners would have the option of compelling the men to work on the basis of ninety hours every two weeks instead of a fixed seven and one half hour day, which the new act requires.

The alternative, contend the owners, is a cut in wages, and this has already been declared totally unacceptable by the men. Although Monday officially is the crucial day, it is possible the situation may not come to head until a few days later. The recommendations of the delegate conference are to be considered by the miners' district bodies and a further meeting of the conference has been called for Thursday.

If South Wales, however, or some other district should strike on Monday it is hardly believed likely there would be much waiting for the ratification of the delegates' conference before the stoppage of work will become general.

PAYNE SAYS NEED FOR MORE LEADERS

Official Count Finished on Amendments on Election Ballot

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—(AP)—An appeal for additional personnel to assist in the army's work of industrial mobilization in preparation for a war emergency was contained in the annual report of the assistant secretary of War Payson. The progress the army is making in its plans for the procurement of materials and the mobilization of industry was reviewed by the assistant secretary. Discussing the procurement plans of the army, he said those completed cover 170 items necessary for the army in a major emergency out of a total of 3876 such items listed.

He added that the present stocks of military supplies were not properly balanced and annual appropriations were barely sufficient to meet current needs.

March on Turin City Hall Plan Of Unemployed

TURIN, Italy, Nov. 28.—(AP)—With many of their leaders in jail as the result of a demonstration yesterday, hundreds of unemployed tonight were guardedly discussing a march to the city hall.

Among the hundreds gathered in cafes in the workers' quarter many have their heads bandaged, the result of a police charge on a mob which filled the "piazza" before the city hall yesterday to ask aid from the mayor.

The situation was aggravated by announcement of the Fiat Automobile company there would be an inventory lay-off on December 1.

FOUR MEMBERS OF FAMILY STABBED

Scene Indicates Terrible Struggle; Friends Know No Motive

POUTHKEEPSE, N. Y., Nov. 28.—(AP)—The bodies of the four members of a family stabbed by an unknown slayer, were found in their Dutchess county farm house at Stanfordville, near here today.

Police found their investigation blocked by the lack of a motive and material evidence. They could merely assume that James Husted of Germond, member of the grange and of the Stanfordville village church, his wife, daughter and son, had been killed in the early evening of Wednesday. The bodies remained undiscovered until today when a creamery, desiring to know why Germond had not delivered his daily milk supply, sent an employee to the Germond home to investigate.

The creamery employee found Germond and his ten year old son Raymond, dead in a wagon house, with the doors closed to conceal the bodies from the view of chance visitors. In the house he discovered the body of Mrs. Mabel Gregory Germond, face down, near the kitchen door, leading to the farm yard.

Seated at a table and in a corner to which she was apparently pursued by the slayer was the body of the daughter Bernice, 18 years old.

Each of the four had been stabbed through the heart with a knife.

Friends of the family said that to their knowledge the Germonds had no enemies.

Berlin Protests Terrorism Acts To League Heads

BERLIN, Nov. 28.—(AP)—The Berlin government today sent a vigorous note of protest to the League of Nations council against alleged acts of terrorism against German inhabitants in upper Silesia during the recent Polish elections.

It charges Polish police looked on without lifting a hand while Germans were submitted to violence and even torture by electioneers who demanded they vote the Pilsudski ticket or get out of the country.

HOOVER JUMPS ADVISE, COURT

President Says he Will Send Protocol to Senate for Ratification

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Against the advice of his own party leaders, President Hoover today announced he would send the protocol for American adherence to the world court to the approaching session of the senate for ratification.

Mr. Hoover urged, however, that the senate leaders reach some agreement for consideration of this controversial issue lest it add to the probability of an extra session of the new congress in the spring which the administration wants to avoid.

But such an agreement was not in sight tonight. Chairman Borah of the senate foreign relations committee who is personally opposed to American entry into the court announced he would put it before the committee promptly. This would bring the issue before the short session. The committee may sidetrack it but a demand to discharge the committee would be in order.

Senator Swanson of Virginia, ranking democrat on the foreign relations committee, and advocate of the court, endorsed the president's move and suggested an agreement to take it up in the session of the senate which meets a year hence. But Senator Walsh of Montana, the assistant democratic leader, urged that it be taken up now or in a special session.

Senator Watson of Indiana, the republican leader, who strongly advised against injecting the world court issue into this session at a conference earlier in the day with the president was fearful tonight that the controversy would lead to the extra session.

There were indications that Mr. Hoover and his party chieftains in the senate had quarreled sharply over the president's determination.

PERU CHIEF GOES DOWN LINE FOR AID

LIMA, Peru, Nov. 28.—(AP)—President Grau of Peru tonight assembled 400 officers of the army, navy and air corps, also police chiefs, in the reception hall of the presidential palace and pleaded with them to unite in solving national problems.

No newspaper correspondents or other civilians were permitted to attend the meeting. The president, it was understood, stressed the fact that since the army and navy had placed him in office after August 22, when he revolted against the "11 years of dictatorship" of Augusto B. Leguia, he would be responsible to them.

When the president had finished he was given an ovation and all present filed up to shake his hand.

Five-Day Week May be Favored By A. Council

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 28.—(AP)—Inauguration of a proposed five-day working week for city employees was given official consideration by the Los Angeles city council today.

A resolution urging such a partial solution of the unemployment problem was discussed by the council, and submitted to its welfare committee for a report.

said he would seek legislation to provide railroad consolidations until congress can enact new laws governing such mergers. He expressed hope his resolution pending in the house to postpone rail consolidations which conflict with an anti-trust laws would be finally approved.

Senator Vandenberg, republican, announced his determination to block efforts of opponents to reapportionment of the house. He believed the opposition would seek to enlarge the number of seats to which he added he was "absolutely" opposed.

Representative Reece, republican, Tennessee, is to confer Saturday with Representative Tilson on proposed modifications of the house bill for private operation of Muscle Shoals with a view to ending the disagreement between the two branches.

Meantime legislation for payment of adjusted compensation certificates of world war veterans found another advocate in Representative Cochran, democrat of Missouri. He said in a statement such legislation would increase the purchasing power in this country by \$2,000,000,000 stimulating both consumption and production. He proposed that conversion of the certificate be optional at a 25 per cent reduction of face value.

A move to authorize the states to make compact for the preservation of their natural resources and sale of agricultural products has been instituted by Representative Sumners, democrat, Texas. He plans to introduce a bill to restructure the federal government in order that they might unify efforts to prevent dissipation of fertility of the soil.

DOAK IS NAMED TO LABOR POST

Green Chagrined at Hoover's Failure to Pick Federation man

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—(AP)—William N. Doak of MeLean, who has been opposed by the American federation of labor today was named secretary of labor by President Hoover.

Doak is legislative representative of the Brotherhood of Railroad trainmen which is not affiliated with the federation. William Green, federation president, has announced that he thought a federation member should be named to the post which James J. Davis will quit next Monday. President Hoover replied to Green in making the appointment.

Hoover Answers Green
"I have the highest respect for Mr. Green and the American federation of labor," Mr. Hoover said, "but Mr. Green's enunciation that appointments must come from one organization is not in keeping with the duty to maintain the principle of open and equal opportunity and freedom in appointments to public office."

Green, in a statement tonight said he was "deeply disappointed" the president had seen fit to go outside his organization to name a secretary of labor.

Doak Slated Before
Doak was suggested as secretary of labor when Mr. Hoover formed his cabinet two years ago but the federation was against the brotherhood representative, William B. Wilson, the first labor secretary, was a federation member, as was Davis and the federation took the attitude that these had set a precedent. The result of that controversy was the retention of Davis but he was elected senator from Pennsylvania in November and a new

labor secretary had to be found. Doak will have to be confirmed by the senate but it was a question tonight whether the federation would continue active opposition to him. There has been no indication from any senate members they were against Doak.

CHARGES INVOLVE CUSTOMS PATROL

DETROIT, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Federal authorities tonight indicated that 75 present and former United States border customs patrol inspectors in the Detroit area are involving in charges of accepting bribes to allow smuggling of liquor into this country from Canada.

Warrants against six were signed this afternoon by J. Stanley Hurd, United States commissioner, on recommendation of Gregory H. Frederick, chief assistant district attorney, in charge of investigation of the patron, six other warrants had been issued previously. Names of those charged today were withheld pending arrest of the men.

Federal authorities said that at least 30 former inspectors would be indicted on graft charges, and that 45 others, against whom criminal charges could not be pressed would be dropped from the force. The total force now is 150.
