Avalanche of Appropriation Bills Threaten law Makers

### Julius Meier Expected Home Early This Week to Start Work

Pre-legislature scouting is beginning and promises to be well under way, now that Thanksgiving is past. Senator Edward Miller of Grants Pass was in Salem Saturday. He was checking up with legislators on the favor which would meet the introduction of the Rogue river fish bill which was defeated as a constitutional amendment in the last election. He said he was sent by southern Oregon sportsmen's organizations to interview legislators and get their viewpoint. The Rogue river fish restriction measure has caused many a legislative battle, and the coming session promises to be no exception. An interim committee is supposed to report, but its findings are problematical.

Many Expected To Seek Money An outbreak of appropriation bills is also expected by veteran legislators. In recent years the deficit in the state treasury, real or expected, served as a buffer against raids on the treasury, With the tax question in the way of settlement the bees are expected to start buzzing where they think the nectar is.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29-(AP) Stern opposition and some support were manifest today among the dry forces to the proposalbroached at a secret meeting of temperance leaders here - that prohibitionists join with the antiprohibitionists in having congress provide for a nation-wide prohibition referendum.

"The record in this case amply supports the contention often made that the rate to the first primary market is most important to the producer of grain," read the public service commission's order. "The producer's country price is generally the market cash price at the nearest primary market less the freight and handling charges into the market. It accordingly follows that a reduction in the in-bound rate to the market is more likely to result in benefit to the producer than reductions in rates beyond the primary market.

"The interstate commerce commission has apparently recognized this principle in establishing specific rates from the principal grain producing territories to Portland somewhat lower than the mileage scale applicable for other hauls, and we will accordingly adopt and prescribe these rates so far as applicable to Oregon intrastate movements.
