

### SILVERTON HOTEL PROJECT APPROVED

SILVERTON, Nov. 29.—The preliminary survey which has been conducted at Silverton to determine the advisability of building a hotel at Silverton has been completed and a representative of the Hockebury Hotel Systems of Pennsylvania, recommended to a group of Silverton business men construction of a modern \$100,000 hotel.

Definite suggestions for the best site of the hotel has not been made but, the Hockebury representative said that the 35 sites which had been considered had, by a process of elimination, been brought down to four. The matter is now in the hands of the Silverton chamber of commerce hotel committee for further study.
