### WET PAVEMENT WRECK CAUSE

#### Number of Pileups Reported in Last few Days in Jefferson Area

JEFFERSON, Dec. 3.—On account of the dense fog and slippery pavement a number of accidents occurred in the vicinity of Jefferson over the weekend Saturday night. A Chevrolet sedan driven by Mrs. J. W. Mays of Salem, accompanied by two women, ran off the highway, striking a telephone pole, when their vision became obscured by fog, and smoke of a passing train. The accident occurred on the highway one mile south of town. The occupants of the car received only minor cuts and bruises. The front end of the car was badly damaged and the windshield broken.

On account of slippery pavement Robert Willis of Eugene, driving a sedan, swerved off the highway and crashed into a post nine miles north of Jefferson Sunday afternoon. No one was injured but the car received a wrecked bumper, radiator and fender and a broken front axle.

Sunday evening a Pacific Greyhound stage crowded a Lebanon touring car off the highway into the ditch one half mile north of town. The car overturned and the occupants escaped injury.

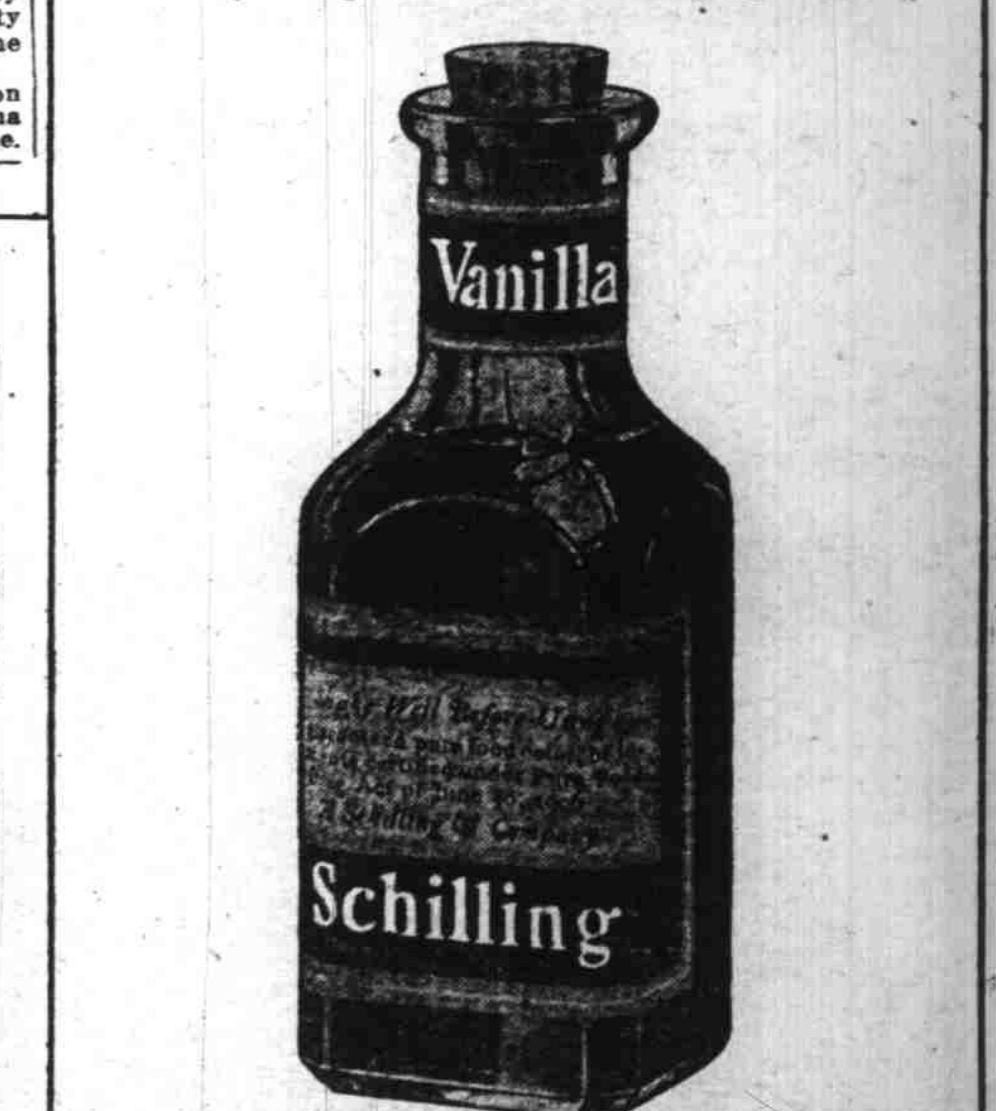

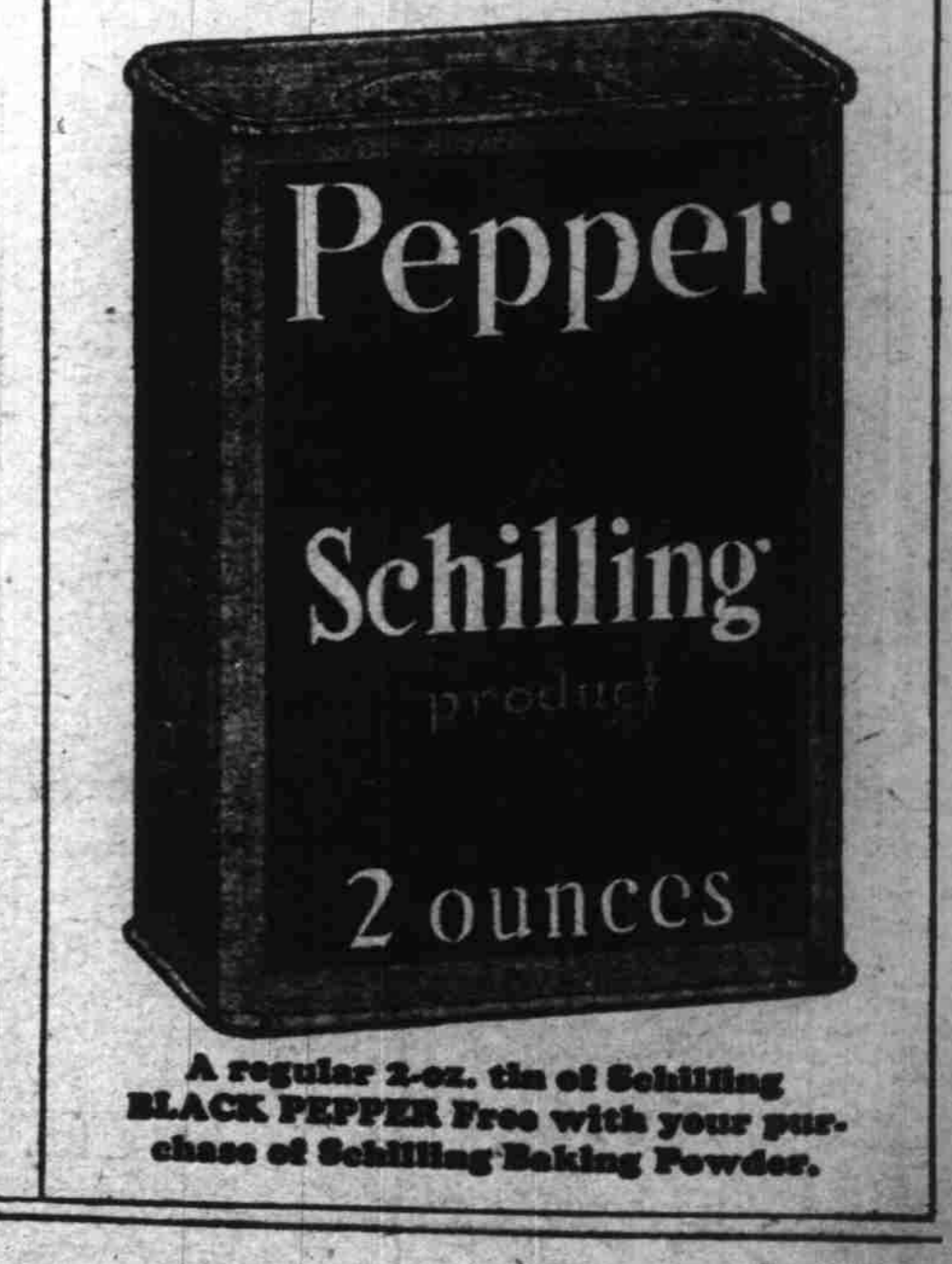

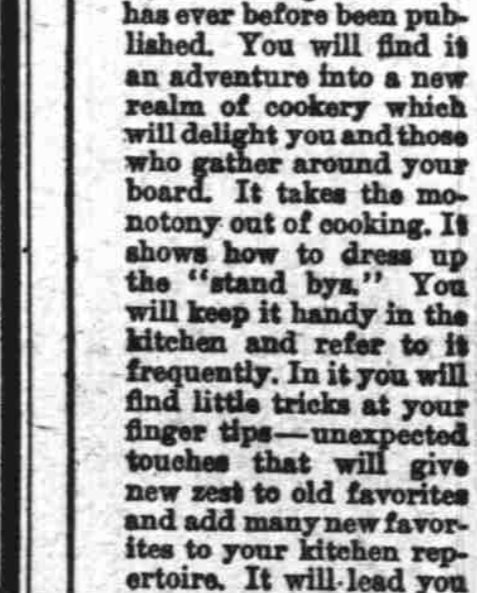
### MANY GEESE, DUCKS BAGGED ON JUNKET
