Sixty Hours in 'Rain' is Stunt Of Movie Stars

The lives of famous movie stars are not all milk and honey. John Hule and Lupa Voles worked five nights in a constant downpour of studio "rain" in recording dramatic scenes for "Resurrection" which Edwin Carewe is directing for Universal.

A railroad depot and an entire train of railway cars were built for these scenes and 300 native Russians appeared in the action which marks the departure of the troops for the frontier. On the screen the rain sequence will run less than 15 minutes but it took 60 hours of tedious labor to record the brief episode.

The pretty woman proves to be a real estate racketeer and a smashing amount of trouble results with plenty of fun and excitement.

The weekend bill for Friday and Saturday is "The Border Legion" written by Zane Gray and in which Richard Arlen, Jack Holt and Fay Wray take the lead. Eugene Pallette adds a huge fun element, as you might expect. This is a western with many thrills and well played. Good looking Richard Arlen is always at his best in cowboy togs and on a horse he manages to keep the watchers eyes close on his actions.

Holt plays the part of a villain in this picture and he does a very good piece of work. In this show as in several others Holt sacrifices to make Arlen happy.

Bela Lugosi and Gregory Gays both seen here recently in "Renegades" at Bligh's Capitol, have in common the facts that they both are movie actors and that each is a political refugee from his native country.

Lugosi, the son of a prominent Hungarian family, an actor of distinction and an infantry captain during the war, found himself on the wrong side of the political fence a few years after the Armistice, and fled into Italy and thence to America.

Gays, of prominent Franco-Russian parentage, was a cadet at the Russian Naval Institute during the World War, and after the revolution joined Kolchak's White army. With Kolchak defeated, he faced the prospect of a firing squad, so went to Manchuria, working his way to Tokyo, and thence to the United States.

To be the stage or screen child of Louise Closser Hale is almost equal to a key to fame. During her long career Miss Hale has mothered many players who are now celebrities. Among them are Frederic March, Chrystal Herna, Rudolph Schildkraut, Violet Kimble Cooper and Grant Mitchell.
