Deal Pending for Rights on Mill Property; Better Source is Wanted

SCIO, Dec: 11-The Scie town council is to meet in adjourned regular session Thursday night for the purpose of completing the details of a deal whereby the city purchases a tract of land from the Scio Mill & Elevator company on which the city pump and reservoir have been located for several years, and for which the city has been paying a monthly rental.

The tract consists of approximately 150 feet frontage and extends to the center of Thomas creek on the south, according to the terms agreed upon between the council and representatives of the mill company at a regular meeting of the city officers Thursday evening. The consideration is stated as \$400.

Authorization of this procedure was made by the adoption of a city ordinance at a special election held November 17, when the result of the ballot showed almost a 10 to 1 decision for the improvement of the water system. The ordinance limits expenditures for this purpose to the sum of \$2500.

It is understood the sale of the tract by the mill company carries with it a cancellation of the asserted contract between the company and the city whereby the latter was to pay to the former the sum of \$240 a year from the mill company's race. This alleged contract had been repudi- years, ated by the council some months ago for the reason that it was the Independence hand. said not to be legal.

From time to time during re cent years samples of the water used in Scio have been submitted to the state board of health for analyses, with the result that frequently the water has been condemned as unsuitable for drinking purposes. Treatment of the water, which comes from Thomas creek through the mill company's race, by chlorination process seems not to have wholly eliminated contamination, hence the move toward more wholesome water by drilling operations and experiments.
