New Rebeaux hats turn brims over modern equivalents of the aligrette; Paton puts a big curling ostrich on the brim of one of his black hats, and allows the feather to trail down over one shoulder; Molynaux tucks feathers into his hats, and uses plumes on his tea gowns, in place of fur.

Jeweled reproductions of these revived plumes are already important fashion. They are on hats, on handbags, on shoulder straps, on lapels, on cuffs.
