Mr. and Mrs. Harold Zeele spent last weekend in Portland visiting with relatives.

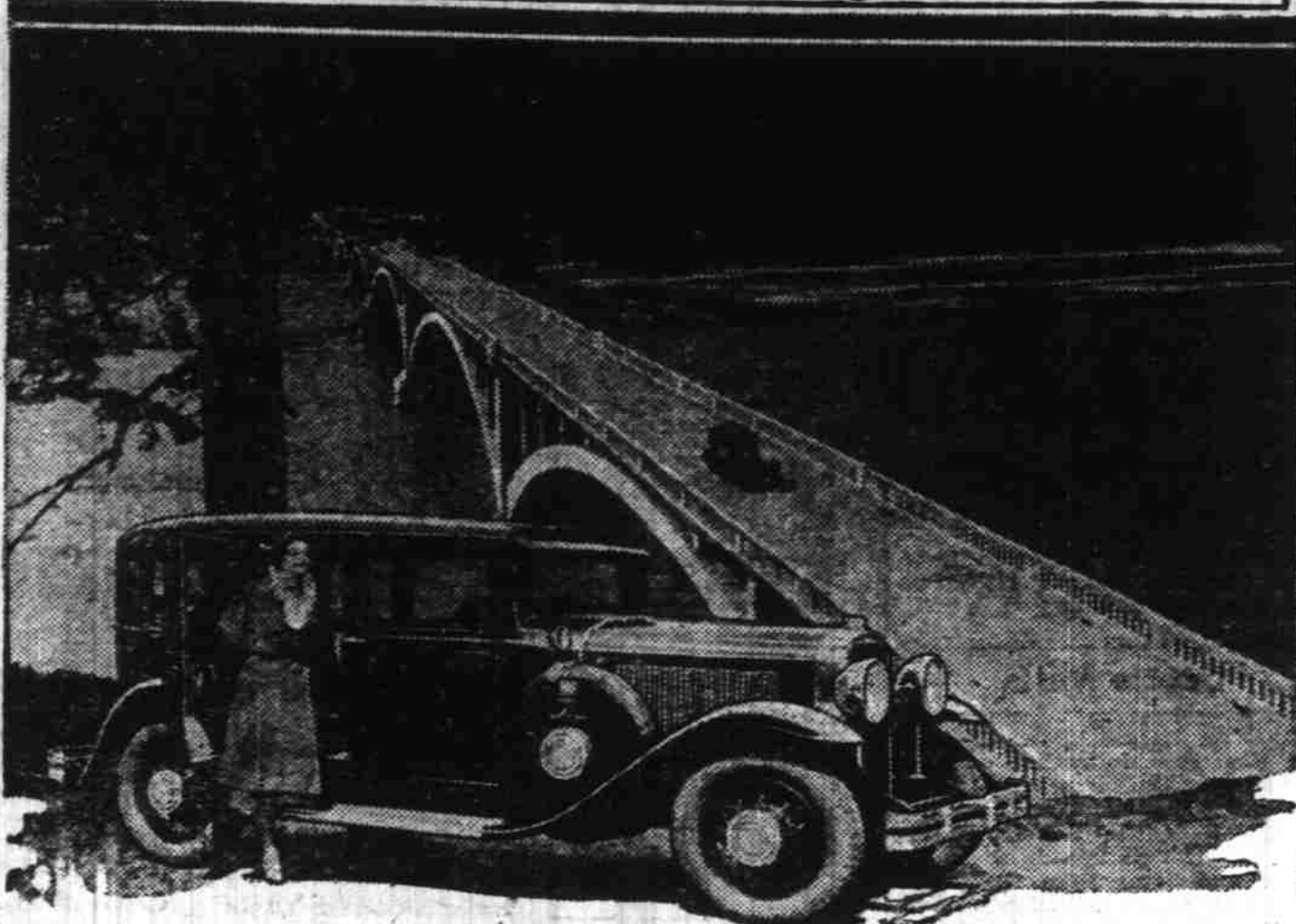
W. R. Dallas and H. G. Gilbert spent Friday fishing on the Salmon river but didn't have any.

Independence

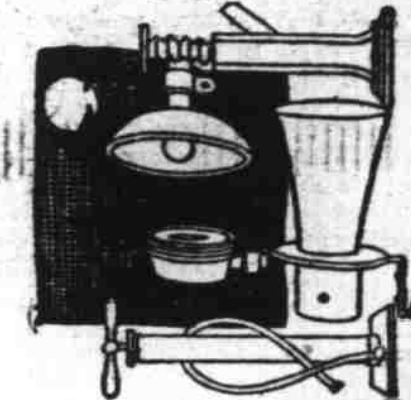
