SUGGESTIONS MADE BY POST OFFICE FOR CHRISTMAS MAIL

The following suggestions have been released by the post office department as helpful in preparing mail for the Christmas season.

Wrapping
All parcels must be securely wrapped or packed. Use strong paper and heavy twine.

Special Packing
Umbrellas, canes, golf sticks, should be reinforced their full length by strong strips of wood tightly wrapped and tied or otherwise sufficiently wrapped to withstand transportation.

Hats: Pack in strong corrugated or fiber boxes. Ordinary pastboard hatboxes must be crated. Ladies' hats and stiff hats easily damaged should be marked "fragile."

Shoes: Pack in strong boxes, preferably corrugated cardboard. Wrap with strong paper securely tied with heavy twine.

Cut flowers: Place in strong suitable boxes of wood, tin, or heavy corrugated cardboard. Wrap with tissue to retain moisture.

Candies: Inclose in strong outside boxes or containers. Drawings, paintings, unmounted maps, etc.: Pack or wrap in strong material to avoid damage. When not flat, roll around a wooden core and then wrap and tie carefully or place in strong pastboard tube.

Sharp-pointed or sharp-edged instruments or tools must have points and edges fully guarded to prevent injury to clerks in handling or damage to other mail. Crate suitably or thoroughly wrap so that they can not cut through the wrapping.

Fragile Objects
Articles easily broken or crushed must be crated or securely wrapped. Use liberal quantities of eyecello, or like material, in, around, and between the articles and the outside container.

Glassware, fragile toys, crockery must be placed so as to prevent the escape of particles or pieces if broken in transit.

Cigars: Ordinary boxes of cigars wrapped in paper only will not be accepted. Pack in a manner to prevent damage by shock or jar. Wrap in corrugated pastboard or similar material. Cigars must be in good shipping condition.

Perishable Matter
Articles likely to spoil within the time reasonably required for transportation and delivery will not be accepted for mailing. Wrap or pack carefully, according to con-

tents, and plainly mark all such parcels "perishable." Use special-delivery stamp: to expedite delivery.

Addresses
Addresses should be complete, with house number and name of street, post-office box or rural-route number, and typed or plainly written in ink. A return card should be placed in the upper left corner of every piece of mail. If a tag is used, the address and return card should also be written on the wrapper for use if tag is lost, and a copy of the address should be inclosed inside the parcel.

Postage
Postage must be fully prepaid on all mail. Affix the required amount of postage in the upper right corner. Full information concerning postage rates can be obtained at the parcel-post or stamp window.

Limit of Weight and Size
No parcel may be more than 84 inches in length and girth combined. For delivery locally and in the first, second and third zones, 70 pounds is the maximum weight; in all other zones, 50 pounds.

Early Mailing
During the holiday time the volume of mail increases approximately 200 per cent. It is a physical impossibility to handle this great mass of mail matter efficiently and promptly within a few days. Therefore to assure delivery of their Christmas presents, cards, and letters by Christmas Day the public should shop and mail early. Do your Christmas shopping so that you can mail your gifts, greetings, and letters to relatives, friends, and loved ones at least a week or 10 days before Christmas, according to the distance. This will not only make it certain that they are received on or before Christmas day, but will be a great aid to your postal service and to postal employees and enable them to spend Christmas day with their families.

Special Delivery Service
The use of a special-delivery stamp will assure delivery on Christmas day, if mailed at the proper time. Special-delivery service means the handling and transportation of parcels with the same expedition as first-class letter mail, as well as the immediate delivery at office of address. It is obtained by affixing a special-delivery stamp of the proper denomination, or its equivalent in ordinary stamps, in addition to the regular postage. When ordinary stamps are used, the words, "special de-

livery" must be written or printed on the envelope or wrapper immediately above the address. It is urged that all mailers desiring immediate delivery of any matter mailed by them affix special-delivery stamps thereto. Special delivery is for speed and not for safety. Valuable mail should be registered or insured.

Matter Not Mailable at Parcel-Post Rates
Written matter in the nature of personal correspondence can not be inclosed in parcels.

Communications attached to parcels: A letter placed in an envelope, addressed to correspond with the address on the parcel and fully prepaid at the first-class rate, may be tied or otherwise securely attached to the outside of the parcel in such manner as to prevent separation therefrom and fourth class mail should be insured. Do not obscure the address on the parcel. Valuable domestic third and

CHRISTMAS FEED HAS BIG EFFECT

The Christmas dinner is one of the most important events of the entire holiday season and its success depends entirely on the ability of the housewife as a manager. Cooking a big dinner requires considerable work but the planning, shopping and preparation should be a pleasure instead of the nerve-racking process it often appears to be.

With regard to planning the Christmas meal it is advisable to do this at least ten days in advance. Determine as near as possible how many persons will be present to enjoy the feast, select the meat dish and build the dinner around it. Watch the advertising columns from now until Christmas for canned food sales and other staple groceries that you know you will use. Order your coffee, spices, salt, pickles, olives and such, far in advance. Any day between now and Christmas will do. It will be only a small item for one housewife with one order, but it will materially help the grocery clerks who will have hundreds of orders to fill.

Order Early
The majority of merchants have agreed that Monday, December 22, is the last date an order can be placed and the patron expect choice goods and service. Most of the local grocery houses will have orders enough by Tuesday morning to rush them until late Wednesday night.

An order placed before the 22nd will assure the housewife that her goods will be personally selected from choice food stuff. The majority of the best quality goods will be gone at least two days before Christmas. The order need not be delivered immediately if the goods are perishable. But if your grocer knows what you want a day or two

ahead he will have it there and will deliver it in ample time.

All early orders will be personally selected and the goods will be the finest obtainable, one grocer assured today. "We will give the best possible service to late orders but in the rush there is certain to be some errors that could have been avoided earlier," he declared.

Markets Stocked
Are you going to have dressing with your turkey on Christmas day? Dressing calls for stale bread and some of the grocers are not going to be able to supply it. Order a few extra loaves of bread Saturday preceding Christmas day. Take off the wrappers and when you are ready to make the dressing there won't be any delay while you are frantically calling for something your grocer probably will not have.

Go down town Saturday or Monday before Christmas and personally select what you want when the clerk has time to assist you. Ex-

plain to him what you want in fruit and vegetables to be delivered later. He will make an extra effort to reward your thoroughfulness with an order of the finest goods in the store.

If the order is to be placed over the telephone, be considerate enough to conserve the clerks time by having a list of exactly what you want, which will enable you to order promptly.

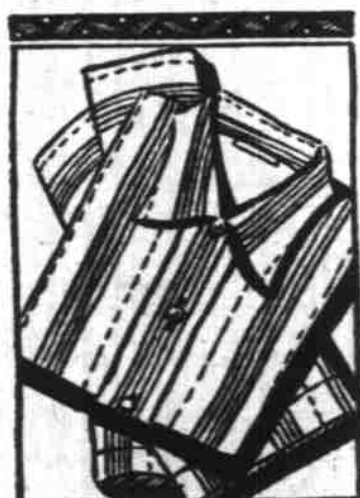

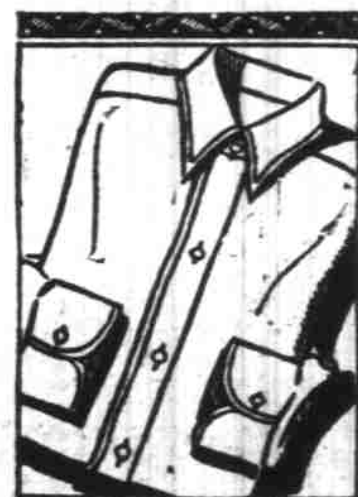
