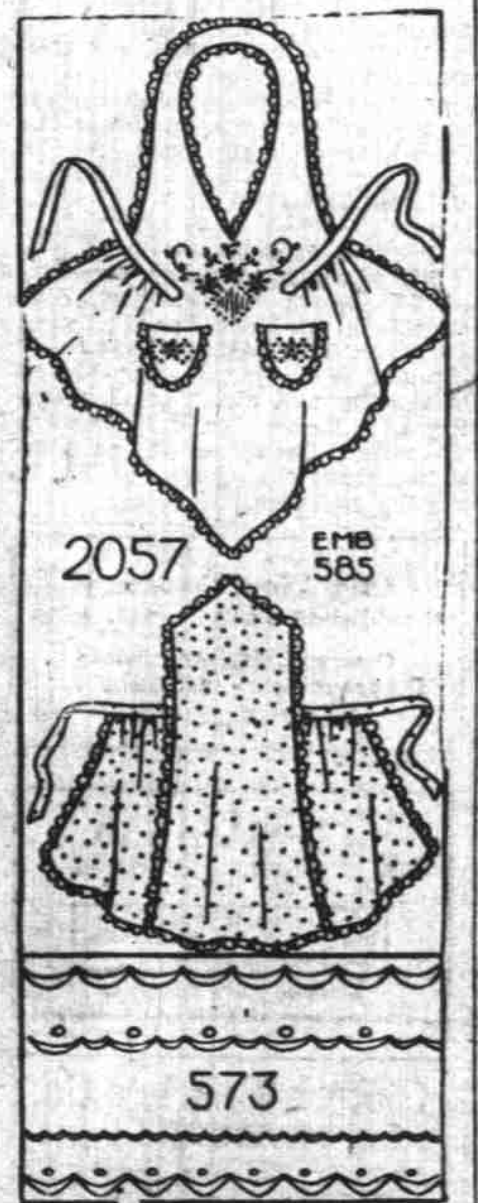
P. L. E. and F. Club Meets

Today's Menu

Date Rocks
1 cup butter
1 cup light brown sugar
2 eggs
4 tablespoons milk
1 cup chopped dates
1 cup chopped nuts
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon cloves
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 cup flour
1 teaspoon soda
Cream the butter and sugar. Add the eggs and milk and beat 2 minutes. Add rest of ingredients. Chill dough and break off bits of it and flatten down, 3 inches apart, on greased baking sheets. Bake 12 minutes in moderate oven. These are moist, rich cookies that remain fresh some time if stored in an airtight box.

Little Fruit Cakes
1 cup fat (1/4 butter)
1/2 cup light brown sugar
2 eggs
1/4 cup grapefruit
1/4 cup lemon juice
2 teaspoons vanilla
2 teaspoons cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon cloves
1 teaspoon nutmeg
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup walnuts, broken
1 cup chopped raisins
1 cup chopped currants
1/2 cup chopped candied pineapple
1/2 cup chopped orange peel
1/2 cup chopped citron
4 cups flour
1 teaspoon soda
Cream the fat and sugar. Add the eggs and grapefruit and beat 3 minutes. Add rest of ingredients. Pour into 6 small pans which have been fitted with waxed papers. Bake 1 1/2 hours in slow oven. When cool, wrap the cakes in waxed papers and tie with gay colored cords. These make most acceptable gifts.
