

5 DIVORCES GIVEN IN DAY IN COURT

Children Generally go into Mother's Custody; Many Causes Alleged

Five divorce decrees were signed yesterday by Judge Gale S. Hill of the circuit court following hearings.

Ruth K. Floustrom was granted freedom from Elmer R. Floustrom, to whom she was married in Vancouver 1924, and whom she charged with desertion. She receives custody of their minor son and \$15 monthly support money.

Maxwell C. O'Brien was granted divorce from Ruth O'Brien. He charged desertion. They were married in Nebraska in October, 1925.

In case of Alice Albers vs. Henry Albers, plaintiff is given a divorce and custody of two minor children. She is also given \$25 monthly support money for the children.

In case of Pauline Riffe vs. John J. Riffe, she was granted divorce and care of two minor children, to whom he is to contribute \$20 monthly support money. They were married in 1902. She alleged that life was made unbearable largely through his use of intoxicating liquors.

S. A. Bauman was granted divorce from Beatrice Bauman on default order. Decree was handed down granting divorce to plaintiff in the case of Lovoy Potter vs. Grover Potter. This case was heard on the previous day. She was given custody of their three minor children.

Corn, Wheat in Mutual Tumble To Low Levels

CHICAGO, Dec. 16—(AP)—Corn led a downward slide of grain today in sympathy with acute weakness of securities. Corn collapsed nearly 3 cents a bushel, with July delivery of wheat dropping 2 cents to new low-price records since 1903. Earlier deliveries of wheat were steadied by purchases for board allies, who were estimated to have brought 2,000,000 bushels deliverable here in May.

Corn closed heavy, 2 1/2 to 2 3/4 cents a bushel lower than yesterday; wheat, unchanged to 1 3/4 cents off, and oats 1 1/2 cents down.

Live Hens Down 3c; Egg Slump Makes Farmer Sell

PORTLAND, Dec. 16—(AP)—Turkey market continued steady at 28 cents for No. 1 birds; No. 2 to 23 cents a pound; receipts lighter but sufficient for a fair demand.

Recent sharp fall of Portland egg prices have affected the poultry market sharply downward. Farmers have begun reducing their flocks and increased receipts on the local market Monday and Tuesday have forced quotations on live hens down around 3 cents a pound.

Country dressed meat quotations were steady on choice veal, 14 cents; 1/2 cent off on pork, 13 cents, and up a cent on lamb, 13 to 14 cents.

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VICTIMS OF LYNCH SEEK HIS PAROLE

Charles Berg and Percy Allen, prominent Portland men, whose business places were robbed by Walter E. Lynch, now serving a term of 20 years in the Oregon state penitentiary, Tuesday appeared before Governor Norblad and urged that Lynch be released from prison under a conditional pardon.

Berg's store was twice robbed by Lynch, who secured approximately \$700. Lynch also robbed the Troy Laundry, of which Mr. Allen is one of the owners. He was arrested while in the act of robbing the latter institution.

Other Portland business men who joined in the application for a conditional pardon for Lynch were J. C. English, C. F. Wright, Alex. M. Oliver and Charles Gramm.

Lynch, who is 34 years old, was received at the penitentiary January 13, 1928, after being convicted on a charge of assault and robbery while armed with a dangerous weapon.

Governor Norblad said he had taken the application under advisement. Lynch previously was employed in Portland.
