Additional Sums Sought in Next Biennium to Pro- vide Secretaries

Administration costs of the university of Oregon during 1929-1930 biennium aggregated \$234,134, while \$234,311 has been requested for the biennium of 1931 and 1932, according to the biennial report of the state board of higher education completed here today.

The expenditures for 1929 and 1930 included the offices of the president, vice president, executive secretary, statistician, business and registrar. It also included an expenditure of approximately \$13,000 for governing boards.

The administration costs of the university for 1931 and 1932, as estimated by the board of higher education, are \$777 in excess of those for the previous two years. It is proposed to increase the appropriation for the president's office \$20,000 for the purpose of providing additional help to handle increased correspondence.

Statistical Costs Go Up
The expenditure for the office of statistician is increased \$3000. The business office, according to the report, is the central business agency of the university to which is delegated the handling of funds, accounting, purchasing and other financial affairs. The cost of operating the business office during the biennium 1929 and 1930 was \$107,233, which is an increase of \$14,615 over the previous biennium.

"During the past two years the university has made notable advances in the field of instruction, research and extension teaching," read the report. The biennial appropriation of \$140,000 by the last legislature for the support of research and extension work made possible greater research activity in the field of education, business and social sciences.

Surveys of educational systems in Oregon counties, studies of industry and trade in Oregon, have already been completed and the results published. Crime surveys, undertaken under the auspices of the new school of applied social science, gives promise that the results in published form may be laid before the next legislature.

Numerous new extension classes have been established in several population centers and the offerings in the field of correspondence work have been diversified.

While not marked by outward evidences of growth and development, the Oregon State college has been characterized by a greatly enlarged service to the people of the state during the past two years.

Extension Service Larger
"The extension service has been decidedly enlarged," read President Kerr's report, "and its contributions to the state have been numerous. Chief among these is specialized service to cooperative marketing associations, in which they may be enabled to conduct their business on approved methods of procedure and be qualified to receive the benefits of loans from the federal farm board. The extension service has also been established in several counties to its broadcasting program, with the latest market quotations coming in over a leased wire."

"Business institutes were carried on in 19 cities in Oregon in 1929, with an attendance of 1100, and to 25 cities in 1930 with an attendance of 3214. Specialists in the school of commerce gave timely help on such problems as accounting, credits, advertising and store organization and management."

1919 Grad in Biennium
"There were 1919 graduates at the college during the current biennium. The distinguished scholarship of many of these graduates, their success in winning recognition in the way of scholarships and fellowships in the graduate schools of the country, and the readiness with which they have generally obtained desirable positions in the business and professional world are noted in many of the reports of the several schools of the college."

Although the Eastern Oregon Normal school at La Grande was not opened until June 17, 1929, the attendance was 424 during the first year. Union county contributed 181 of these students, while Umatilla county was second with 57 students.

"The location of the Eastern Normal school and the nature of its work strongly suggests that provision shall be made for necessary extension work," read the report. "The construction of a dormitory is urgent in order to promote the social life of the institution."

Reports from the Southern Oregon Normal school at Ashland, the state normal school at Monmouth showed these institutions to be in fine condition. The enrollments have increased substantially, and considerable has been accomplished with relation to improvement.

Johnny Farrell, former open champion, Horton Smith, leading money winner for two seasons; Whiffy Cox, Harry Cooper, the Espinosa, Denny Shute and others will join Sarazen in the hunt for the pots-of-gold in later events.

More than fifty competitive contests have been arranged for 1931's first quarter, with the majority testing the skill of the amateurs and women marksmen.

dent is barred from driving a car on the state or county highways.

The governor said he would recommend passage of a law that would make homicide justifiable in cases where a bank or other financial institution is being robbed. The governor declared that such a law had been requested as a result of the recent crime wave and numerous bank robberies in other states.

Interest on Balances
Would go to General Fund
The recommendation also will be made to the legislature that interest on all daily balances of state funds, with the exception of trust accounts, accrue to the general fund. The governor said such a law would return a large amount of money to the state annually. He also will recommend that all state officials handling state funds be required to provide a surety bond protecting the state against loss or default.

DIPHTHERIA CURE BEING IMPROVED

VIENNA, Dec. 27.—(AP)—Marked improvement in the use of external treatment for immunization against diphtheria was announced today by Dr. H. Baar and Dr. H. Benedict of the Vienna St. Anne's Children's hospital. Under the process introduced by the Austrian professor Lowenstein, the diphtheria anti-toxin was rubbed into the skin in the form of a salve, but required a long period to become absorbed. Dr. Baar and Dr. Benedict first applied the process in which the skin is reddened and then rub in the salve with greatly improved effect.

A test of the treatment's effect on a hundred immunized children by determination of the quantity of counter poison in the blood and the skin showed the mustard method improved the anti-toxin's efficacy from 13 to 27 per cent, also greatly accelerating the arrival of immunity.

Ramblers Given Highest Honors By Erskine Men

NEW YORK, Dec. 27.—(AP)—The Rough Riders from Notre Dame, for the second successive year, have been selected by the Erskine award committee as the outstanding football team of the country, and winners of the Albert Russell-Erskine cup.

The cup will be presented to the team from South Bend in New York.

W. O. McDougal, chairman of the committee, in announcing the result today said three teams were selected from the preliminary balloting as outstanding—Notre Dame, Alabama and Southern California. On the final vote Notre Dame received 561 votes, Alabama 5, and Southern California 6. The five Alabama votes came from Alabama, Tennessee, New Mexico, Illinois and Mississippi.

inal complaints of Lucas against Norris' republicanism, but Norris committed he believed Governor Roosevelt of New York, a democrat, was near the right position on the power trust, which "I believe is the greatest issue in America."

The Nebraska declined to say whether he would support Roosevelt as against President Hoover. He pointed out that he disagreed with the governor on prohibition.

In a statement dictated to re-publican national headquarters from his Ohio home, Nutt said the \$50,000 was placed in a local bank merely for "bookkeeping convenience," that \$23,000 of it was expended exclusively in congressional campaigns, and that a detailed report of the expenditures was on file in the capital when Nye called it a slush fund. Not one dollar was used to oppose any senator, Nutt added.

\$40,000 Fund Opened
"For Lucas's Convenience"
Wade H. Cooper, president of the Commercial National bank of this city, testified before Nye's campaign funds committee last Monday that Nutt opened a \$40,000 account with the bank last October 23 for the "convenience" of Robert H. Lucas, executive director of the national committee.

It also was disclosed this special fund was pledged as security for a \$4,000 personal loan to Lucas, part of which went for literature to be used in a campaign against Senator Norris in Nebraska.

Nye has subpoenaed the checks drawn on the special fund in the belief it would be shown that more money was used to oppose Norris and that other republican independents were fought similarly. He was out of the city today.

Lucas has lately confined his efforts solely against Norris, saying he has no quarrel with other republican independents because they supported the national ticket in 1928, while Norris did not.

CASUALTIES MOUNT
IN ARGENTINE TOWN

SALTA, Argentina, Dec. 27.—(AP)—Huddled in tents in a public square, the inhabitants of the little town of La Poma tonight listened with increasing dread and apprehension to reports volcanic energy is being released under the village an earthquake laid in ruins Christmas eve.

Thirty-nine are known to have been killed; 35 are seriously injured and others are missing and feared to be dead.

Ten more shocks, three of them sharp and intense, have been felt since yesterday at noon.

Meanwhile the appearance of the whole countryside has changed, giving rise to fears La Poma may be directly over an intense volcanic disturbance. Gaping cracks show in the sides of hills and other spots present an altered, wavelike appearance with great splits of unknown depth which are said to be increasing in size.

Destruction is so complete in the village of La Poma emergency appeals have been set out for aid to include cooking utensils, these having been lost with other household belongings.

ALGIERS, Algeria, Dec. 27.—(AP)—A landslide which followed heavy rains buried a native wedding party in the suburbs of Algiers tonight, with the dead believed to number about 20. The bodies of three Arabs were recovered almost immediately and rescuers worked feverishly to extricate the others.
