

## McCANN DRAWS VOTE ON FOUL

Barton and Wildcat Break Even on Falls, Putting On Good Show

"Wildcat" McCann of Salem, was awarded the decision on an unintentional foul over "Rough House" Barton of New York, after each wrestler had secured a fall at the armory Friday night.

McCann took the first fall in 23 minutes with a reverse crab hold. This is the first time this catch has been shown in Salem. Referee "Mat" McHenry stated that it was the first time he had seen it.

The second fall went to Barton in 17 1/2 minutes after a series of headlocks which put McCann out of good working order. A few moments before this fall McCann saved himself from a crab hold by crawling under the ropes.

The foul, which doubtless was unintentional, came after 3 1/2 minutes and left McCann completely out. He was carried from the ring. Referee McHenry announced that he was forced to give the match to McCann although he was satisfied that the foul was not so intended.

In a preliminary Dan Hale of Portland took two straight falls from Lloyd Bright of Corvallis, in 6 and 5 1/2 minutes although he was considerably outwrestled. "Mat" McHenry, of Albany, refereed both matches. Harry Levy was the announcer and "Bob" Williamson the timekeeper.

## Record Tides on Coast Threaten Indian Village

HOQUIAM, Wash., Jan. 2.—(AP)—Record high tides which threatened destruction of residences and a salmon cannery flooded the Indian town of Taholah on the Quinalt reservation west of here today.

A large portion of the residence section of the town was under water and heavy damage was reported. With still higher tides due tomorrow and Sunday residents fear the destruction may duplicate that at Neclips several years ago, when a hotel and several cottages were swept into the sea by the waves. Neclips is a beach resort near Taholah.

## PORTLAND PAIR ARE GRANTED MORE TIME

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 2.—(AP)—Nelson C. Bowles, Portland millionaire, and Irma G. Loucks, his former secretary, indicted recently for the first degree murder of Bowles' wife, were given a week in which to enter their pleas when they were arraigned in circuit court here today.

Mrs. Leone C. Bowles, 32, was stabbed to death in Miss J. Uck's apartment last November 12. At the request of George Mowry, deputy district attorney, Dr. Paul B. Cooper, who attended Mrs. Bowles after the stabbing, W. H. Cullers, Bowles' business associate, and Ralph D. Shelley, Cullers' chauffeur, were ordered held as material witnesses under \$2500 bail each.

## Stocks as Well As Commodities In Jovial Rally

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—(AP)—That happy New Year spirit hung over the leading security and commodity markets today. Stocks, after some hesitation, expressed their greetings to 1931 in a rally that was considerably larger than Wednesday's.

The share market got up its best head of steam in the afternoon when it turned losses of 1 to 2 points into net gains of 1 to 4. Rails, motors, oils, utilities and miscellaneous industrials and specialties, relieved from the bogey of tax selling, displayed the best recuperative powers since December 17, the date of the automatic rally from the 1930 lows.

## Girl Victor Over Clutch Of Paralysis

CHICAGO, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Frances McGann, 24 year old student nurse, is no longer "the respiratory" girl.

The breathing machine was wheeled away today, signifying victory for the young woman in her strange battle with a fear she could not sleep outside it.

The battle began last September when infantile paralysis gripped the muscles of her lungs, arms and legs. She was placed in the respirator which did her breathing for her.

As the days passed, she regained the use of her lung muscles, but apprehension she could not sleep outside the big grey contraption that snored rhythmically while "breathing," seized her. Encouraged by doctors and nurses, the frightened girl essayed an attempt. The next effort and the next were not so terrifying. Now she sleeps easily out of it. Now only a minor battle with holds complete triumph for her. Paralysis has not relaxed its hold on her arms and legs entirely. But she is confident of ultimate victory.

## General Escobar Found in Canada; Wife Suing Him

EL PASO, Tex., Jan. 2.—(AP)—Mystery concerning the residence of General Jose Gonzalez Escobar, who led an unsuccessful revolution in Mexico in 1929, was removed today when attorneys for Mrs. Escobar in announcing they had filed suit for annulment of her marriage, said the revolutionist was living in Montreal, Canada.

Escobar's whereabouts had not been generally known since he abandoned his army in Mexico in 1929. Attorneys for Mrs. Escobar, who said the annulment action had been filed in Quebec courts, stated Escobar was known in Montreal as J. De las and that he was living with Elisa Valles, his first wife.

## FOOTBALL HAS SEVERE ATTACK

Over-Emphasis Game Given Repeated Statement in Recent Meetings

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—(AP)—College athletics in general and football in particular, still suffering somewhat from the growing pains of super-salesmanship and ballyhoo, have been abruptly brought face to face with somewhat critical conditions for 1931.

This conclusion, drawn from a comprehensive survey of the national situation by the Associated Press, is emphasized by the cross-fire of criticism leveled at intercollegiate football during the final week of the old year by orators from many sections of the country.

Complexities Accumulate  
What many close observers regard as the severest crisis in the past decade is due, not to any one set of clearly defined causes, however, but to an accumulation of complexities, chief among them are the combined effects of over-emphasis and the effects of considerable depression in the region of the box offices.

So long as college football was on the crest of a popular wave, buoyed by general prosperity, the indoor critics usually were tossed for a loss by the outdoor performers. Reformers were forgotten after the first kickoff.

Now, however, voices of the undeniable and potent authority have been raised in the widespread attack upon objectionable features of the gridiron game. Football does not in the majority opinion, appear to be "riding for the fall" that its severest critics anticipate. Nevertheless a combination of factors, ripened since the publication of the famous Carnegie foundation report, has spurred coaches and executives to seek the reduction of such over-emphasized features as training camps and spring practice; to wipe out the evils of subsidizing and recruiting; to curb the dangers of too much commercialism in schedule-making.

Spring Practice Taboo  
Effective measures, notable among the eastern "old guard" already have been taken to abolish spring practice altogether as a means of deflecting mounting criticism against high pressure football methods. The measures follow the steps already taken by such conference groups as in the Big Ten and on the Pacific coast designed to keep football from dominating too much.

Depressed business conditions have not hit all of the major colleges by any means, notably in such sections as the Pacific northwest, Rocky Mountain and southwest areas where football "books" were enjoyed last fall, but the Associated Press survey reveals four out of every five institutions have been forced either to economize sharply on athletic expenses or curtail activities.

Many to "Weather Through"  
Universities where football comes under the heading of "big business" have been able to survive, reduced revenue without indicating the necessity of anything further than ordinary economy in their programs for

1931. This applies especially to such institutions as Yale, Harvard and Pennsylvania in the east; Northwestern, Illinois, Michigan and Ohio State in the middle west; California, Southern California, Stanford and Washington in the far west.

The more favored of the big fellows will go ahead with programs of expansion in contrast with the generally widespread policies of retrenchment for the new year. Illinois, for example, will construct a new \$325,000 ice rink as well as a \$40,000 12-hole golf course. As a result of record football crowds in the Pacific northwest, football stadium at Seattle and Portland are to be enlarged.

## RENAULT FLOP IN COMEBACK TRYOUT

Small Crowd out to Witness Dull Exhibition; Belgian Easy Victor

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Jack Renault, a relic of the days when Jack Dempsey was in his prime, tried the comeback road tonight, and found the way barred by the youthful, but awkward Pierre Charles of Belgium.

Meeting in Madison Square Garden before a crowd of only 7,500 the lanky Belgian clubbed out a ten round decision over Renault, who once claimed the Canadian heavyweight title.

Like many of the recent fights in the garden pit, the battle was not much to get up and about about. Charles, with his long reach, did most of the clubbing while Renault did most of the holding on. The Associated Press score sheet gave the big Belgian seven of the ten rounds while Renault took one and two were even.

Charles started out to subdue his veteran opponent in the first round and almost accomplished the trick with the long swinging lefts that felt like perpetual motion on Renault's head. The Canadian came back strong, however, and managed to hold his opponent even in the second session by walking inside of his lanky arms.

Starting with the sixth, Charles shifted his attack to the body and slowly wore his clinging opponent down, but by the time he had Renault tired out the Belgian was also ready to say quits. Flashing some of his old style attack, Renault managed to win the tenth round.

Charles weighed 213 pounds and Renault 213 1/2.
