

Building permits for 1930 totalled \$529,406.85 for the city of Salem. This is a decrease o \$830,768.30 from that of 1929 December, 1930, showed a \$8;-185,63 increase over that of the same month the year before.

The two highest figures came in August, 1929, and March, 1930. The amount for the former was \$530,336.00 while the latter was but \$158,706.10. The total building permits for

the year 1930, as alotted to each month is as follows: January, \$30,732.25: February, \$27,-029.00: March. \$158,706.10; April, \$58,717.75; May, \$34,-195.30; June, \$37,827.65; July, \$17,458.10; August, \$16,907.18; September \$20,365.07; October, \$77,559.45; November, \$17,-739.50; December, \$32,187.50.

A closer survey of the building permit records show the following figures: 1930, new buildings, \$420,088.07; alter and repair jobs, \$109,318.78; total, \$529,406.85. 1929, new build-ings, \$1,202,264.00; alter and repair jobs, \$156,911.15; total, \$1,359,175.15.

The individual divisions for the December, 1930, balance sheet shows new buildings at \$13,370; alterations and repairs, \$17,817.50; and the total at \$32,187.50.
