

Hoover Sees Fine Future for Auto Industry in New Year

'CHEERFUL IN USE OF CARS'

Despondency not Justified, President's View in Banquet Address

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—(AP)—Addressing by telephone the national automobile chamber of commerce, President Hoover said tonight:

"The despondency of some people of the future is not borne out by the statistical evidence or prospect in respect to the automobile industry."

Analyzing the automobile production, road building and gasoline consumption during the last year, the president said the figures indicated "we have been cheerful in the use of our automobiles."

"I do not assume," he added, "they are being used for transportation to the poor house."

"The future of the automobile industry," he said, "does not warrant any despondency."

The address, in part, follows: "I am glad to extend this greeting to the automobile industry of the United States as represented in your banquet in New York city tonight."

"I am informed that if I were speaking to every person whose livelihood is directly or indirectly dependent upon the industry, I should be speaking to one person in every 10 of the people of our country. Therefore, the prosperity of the industry is the anxious thought of the nation, and everybody wishes you well in your plans to expand the manufacture and use of your product."

"The despondency of some people over the future is not borne out by the statistical evidence of prospects in respect to the automobile industry. I am informed by the department of commerce that despite the depression, you have manufactured and sold during the year, over 3,500,000 new automobiles. You have also disposed of large inventories of a year ago. Hundreds of miles of new roads are being constructed every day in the world and these increasing miles must be equipped with more automobiles."

"I am informed also that the consumption of gasoline during the last year shows an increase of 5 per cent over even the highly optimistic year of 1929."

"Old Cars Wear Out"—This certainly indicates that we have been cheerful in the use of our automobiles; I do not assume they are being used for transportation to the poor house. While I am aware that many people are using the old automobile a little longer, it is obvious that they are still using it and that it is being worn out. Altogether the future for the industry does not warrant any despondency."

"No one needs to recall the utility and importance of the automobile in our national life. I have wondered, however, if part of its popularity was not due to the exhilarating sense of power that we all inhale through the mastery over time and space we gain from it. It brings a sense of freedom. That makes our spirit rise even though it sometimes invites for some people the depressing ministrations of a motorcycle policeman."

Order to Build Railroad Cross State is Held up

The interstate commerce commission has postponed the effect of its order requiring the Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation company to start construction of the cross-state railroad between Crane and Crescent Lake from January 1 to April 1.

The action was taken because of a suit now pending in the courts in which the railroad company is attacking the order of the interstate commerce commission.

The cross-state railroad is a part of the railroad development program launched by the Oregon public service commission several years ago.

HOLT HEAD OF TWO MEDFORD THEATRES

Genial Manager of Capitol Grew up in Theatre Work in Salem

Archie Holt, genial manager of the Capitol theatre since it was opened by Frank D. Biligh in 1926, took a flying trip to Portland Tuesday and came back to Salem with a contract consummated with Floyd Maxwell, division manager of Fox Oregon theatres, which makes Holt manager of the Fox Rialto in Medford. Holt will leave Thursday to take up his new position.

The announcement will be received with regret by the many friends of smiling "Arch" who has grown up in Salem, where he graduated from high school, and where he began the show "racket" during the time he was completing high school. He began as an usher in the old Grand then owned by Frank Biligh, Sr., where he worked through all the show business from mechanical department to assistant manager.

Later he went into the selling end of the picture business by becoming a representative of one of the large booking concerns of the country. Mr. Holt was manager of theatres in Albany, Klamath Falls, and was assistant manager of the Heilig theatre in Seattle. He left Seattle to buy the old Grand theatre in Salem where he was the first to introduce association vaudeville to Salem. Under the General Theatres corporation from which Warner Bros. purchased the Capitol and Elsinore, Mr. Holt was working for both theatres and bought and booked all pictures.

Although the position of manager of the Warner Bros. theatre is his if he will stay in Salem, yet said Mr. Holt in discussing the change, "I feel that the opportunity offered me in Medford is much too good to pass up even though it means leaving my home in Salem and establishing new contacts."

Mrs. Holt and daughter, Patsy, will remain for another week before joining Mr. Holt.

7 Bodies Taken From Mine; Big Explosion Cause

GLEN ROGERS, W. Va., Jan. 6.—(AP)—Seven bodies had been recovered tonight from the Raleigh Wyoming company's mine near here, scene of an explosion of "local" character early today, and search was continued for an eighth man.

Approximately 40 other miners escaped after the blast, state mine inspectors were preparing at the time to enter the mine for the monthly inspection.

The mine normally employs about 450 miners on the day and night shifts.

they came in at intervals and flew all the way in the same fashion.

Flight Starts in Africa
Started at 2 a. m. (GMT) (9 p. m. Monday EST) while darkness still hung over Africa, the Italian squadron lifted anchor and soared out for the long flight across the southern Atlantic.

At 2:40 a. m. GMT, they passed the Dariceo, first of the Italian vessels along the route. At 4:37 GMT, they passed the Tarigo and 7:06 same time, flew over the Vivaldo.

Thereafter, they sped over the tossing ocean and crossed the lonely island of Fernando do Noronha at 2:55 p. m. local time, 11:55 a. m. EST) swung straight for St. Paul rock and finally zipped to a stop on the waters of Natal harbor at 4:15 p. m.

Crowd Out, Thrilled As are Great Aviators

A great crowd was out to welcome the visitors, the people coming from miles around despite heavy rains last night and it was a thrilling moment, not only for the natives, but for the aviators who had completed such a long and hazardous trip.

By 4:55 p. m. all the planes were safely anchored and General Italo Balbo who is Italian minister of air, disembarked with his aides to be welcomed by Brazilian officials. The general was naturally elated for he had said before the start that if half the planes which left Italy December 17 reached Brazil, it would be a remarkable achievement.

After three days here the Italians will go on to Rio de Janeiro.

Word of the death at Toledo, Ore., December 25, of Mrs. Julia Schaffer, 78, mother of Mrs. S. S. Swarts of Salem, has been received. Interment was made in Newton cemetery at Philomath.

Mrs. Schaffer was born at Oslo, Norway, in 1853, and came to the United States and the state of Minnesota 15 years later. With Joseph Schaffer, to whom she was married in 1889, she came to Oregon in 1900 and lived at Philomath until Mr. Schaffer died in 1905. At the time of her passing, Mrs. Schaffer lived with her son, Robert, at Toledo.

In addition to the daughter at Salem and son at Toledo, the following children survive: Henry and Julius Schaffer, Mrs. R. N. Baldwin and Mrs. Albert Mattoon, all of Toledo, Mrs. H. Hogenau of Portland, N. D., and Fred of Minneapolis, Minn. A son, John, is dead. Eight sisters also survive.

FEE FOR BOARD IN HOSPITALS, IS IDEA

such part of this amount as they are able to pay. Creation of a department bureau in the office of the state board of control, and a department for the collection of monies from patients financially able to pay, also will be recommended by the board.

Another recommendation will provide that state aid to blind students who desire to take some university course be limited to four years, instead of for an indefinite period as at the present time. Under the existing laws these students are allowed \$500 per year by the state. In cases where blind students take less than 16 hours of study per week, they would be paid in proportion to the full amount allowed for a complete course of 16 hours per week, with a maximum of \$10 per month. The money would be paid to the teachers and not to the blind students.

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The board also approved a request of the circuit judges that they be furnished a set of Oregon codes each county in which they reside. The law provides that all self-sustaining state de-

partments, boards and commissions shall pay for these codes at the rate of \$35 each. It was found that the circuit judges have no funds for this purpose.

Another recommendation of the board urged the purchase by the state of the Steiner-Jarman building, which was erected adjacent to the state capitol grounds a few years ago and has since been leased to the state. The cost of the property has been fixed at \$84,000. It was said that the rentals received from this structure, on the basis of other state rentals, would pay for the structure in 14 years. The building is now occupied by the state printing department.
