Says Transaction Void—Rolland Jory, in answer to recover money on promissory notes instituted by the Chas. K. Spaulding Logging company, yesterday filed answer declaring that plaintiff purchased from the First National bank of Salem notes given for work of the Pacific Fruit Canning and Packing company, which notes were void. Jory asserts the notes were void because at time of sale of the stock the canning and packing company had not obtained permit to do business. He charges the bank organized the company to liquidate indebtedness of the old Cunningham Fruit company. When defendant paid interest on notes, he did not know the transaction was invalid, he says. He says further he delivered to the packing company \$440 worth of berries to be paid on payment of note. He asks that the plaintiff take nothing.

GENERAL SAYS U. S. AID NEED

South American Republics Unable to Stand Upon Own Feet, View

With the contempt of an army officer for the republics south of the Rio Grande, General Charles H. Martin, U. S. A., retired, defended the presence of marines in countries like Nicaragua where they can preserve order and the interlocking of the illiterate peoples. A mixture of Spanish, Indian and negro, only 3% of them literate, rent by factions, poor, they are not "George Washingtons" but would fall to pieces without the strong arm of Uncle Sam to lean upon.

General Martin was discussing before Salem Rotarians the Panama canal where he served as governor in post-war years. He also described one of the pop-gun revolutions which took place during his term there. The president of the Panama republic was having a revolution on his hands and asked for help from Uncle Sam.

Gen. Martin replied he would not come without full authority over the whole republic. In an hour the president accepted the conditions, Gen. Martin moved troops in motor trucks to Panama and in a very brief time had ordered restored and the president back in authority, very grateful to the American soldiers for the timely aid. "Revolution," said General Martin, "is the only way the South American states can change their governments. Otherwise the president continues or his relatives or friends."

Martin Flays Pacifists
General Martin, who was elected as congressman from the Portland district in November, has long been identified with the northwest, coming to Fort Vancouver first in 1897. In his talk he flayed pacifists, saying he feared the day when the pacifists might put over their program of disarmament as most unfortunate for the country and for civilization. "We need a strong, powerful government," was his assertion.

The general described the canal and its history, how 100,000 lives were lost in building the railroad and 65,000 in the French attempt at construction. He referred to Engineer John F. Stevens as the "father of the canal" and had high praise for General Goethals who drove the ditch through in the ten-year period and within the estimate of cost.

So far as talk about a second canal through Nicaragua is concerned, General Martin said it was just politics. The Panama canal is handling only one-third of its capacity now and is operating only 16 hours a day. At the rate of growth of traffic the canal will serve until 1960. By putting in a third lock and a dam the capacity can be increased to take care of the traffic for yet another century, until 2060.

Frank Dekebach was the five-minute speaker and gave a very interesting sketch of his own life from his birth in Civil war days in Cincinnati to his coming west in the late '80s to Washington territory, his service there as senator, collector of the land office, chairman of the republican state central committee, editor; and then to Oregon, where he first managed the brewery business and later operated the Marion creamery.

\$30,000 JOB, CAMP CLATSOP, TO BEGIN

Construction work at Camp Clatsop involving expenditure of \$30,000 will be launched immediately, according to authority given Major General George A. White, of the national guard in a telegram received yesterday from the war department.

The installations will include 14 mess halls and two combination bath houses. Forms required in advertising for bids which are customary in all government jobs are being rushed from Washington by air mail. It is expected bids will be advertised for not later than the middle of next week, and that work will follow within 10 days.

Normally this work would be done in the spring or late summer, but the promptness of the war department in this instance was due to urgency of Major General White, who asked that the construction be expedited in order to help relieve the unemployment situation in this state. Clatsop county men will be employed on the project.

TUMBLERS WORK OUT FOR EXHIBIT

Ferry Street to Be Blocked for Inaugural Ball

The mayor's committee in charge of arrangements for the governor's ball and reception and which is headed by Col. T. E. Riley, has petitioned the Salem council to clear Ferry street from South Commercial street to South High street of all vehicles the night of the governor's ball, January 13. A request has also been made by the committee of the council to block off Liberty street from Ferry to High street this space to be used for parking space only to accommodate cars of the guests.

An unusual incident in connection with the plans for the ball and reception is that one of the crack Southern Pacific trains with all the features for comfort of a transcontinental flyer will bring guests from Portland to Salem. Everything from bath rooms to private state-rooms and drawing rooms will be available on the train.

New Proposal to Run Incinerator With Committee

The city council's newly named committee on public buildings and the incinerator has under consideration a plan of disposing of garbage wherein the entire cost of conducting the disposal plant would be handled by the Salem Sanitary service.

The manager of the newly organized concern is Fred D. Thielens. He has informed the council that his company can obtain sufficient revenue from private home owners for the disposal of garbage, to permit his firm to operate the incinerator. The company would also gain some revenue from the refuse of iron and paper it picked up.

L. D. Jones of Medford, a former Salem man, is associated with Thielens in the new company.
