WOODBURN HI TO STAGE PLAY

"Intimate Strangers" to be Presented by Student Cast

WOODBURN, January 7.—The cast for the play, "Intimate Strangers" to be presented by the senior class of Woodburn high school was chosen by the play's director, Miss Virginia Mason Tuesday. Tryouts were held before the Christmas vacation and the best two, and in some cases, three applicants for parts were chosen and asked to present skits before the final selections were made.

The eight persons chosen to take the parts are: William Ames, of middle age, Jack Guiss; Isabel Stuart, of uncertain age, Jessie Sims; Florence, a thoroughly modern girl and Isabel's great niece, Gelta Mae Hunt; Johnny White, a young, likeable chap who is much in love with Florence, but doesn't know it, Gorda Klamp; the station-master, a rustic, and a character, Chas. Wendel; Aunt Ellen, who is horrified at this "modern age"; Maxine Gelsy; Mattie, the maid at the farm house, Phyllis Keenig; and Henry, a serving man, Melvin Watt.

As the play is considered rather difficult for high school students to produce, Miss Mason used infinite care in selecting the cast and the result is probably one of the best casts for a play yet presented at Woodburn. The business manager and other officers have not yet been chosen.

"Intimate Strangers," a great success on Broadway a few years ago, was written by Booth Tarkington. The play is scheduled to be presented at Woodburn high school January 30.

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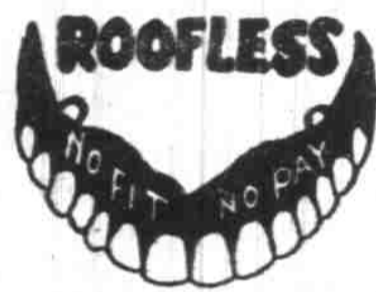
