- Cream Pie For Dinner
- Sliced Roast Beef
  - Glazed Carrots and Peas
  - Bread
  - Cranial Jelly
  - Cream Salad
  - Coffee
- Glazed Carrots and Peas
- 1 cup sliced carrots (cooked)
  - 1 cup sliced peas (cooked)
  - 2 tablespoons butter
  - 4 tablespoons sugar
  - 1/4 teaspoon salt
- Heat the butter and sugar and cook slowly until light brown color. Add the carrots and peas slowly until they have browned. Add the rest of ingredients and serve at once.
- Peach Salad
- 6 halves canned peaches
  - 1 cup finely chopped celery
  - 1/2 cup brine pickle
  - 1-2 teaspoon salt
  - 1-2 cup salad dressing
  - 1-2 cup celery, nuts, salt and dressing and spread over the peaches, which have been arranged on lettuce leaves. Chill ingredients before combining.
- Cream Pie (Cake Part)
- 4 tablespoons butter
  - 1/2 cup sugar
  - 1/2 cup milk
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla
  - 1/4 teaspoon salt
  - 2 teaspoons baking powder
  - 1-2 teaspoon salt
- Crumm the butter and sugar. Add rest of ingredients and beat 3 minutes. Pour into 2 shallow cake pans which have been lined with waxed paper. Bake 15 minutes in moderate oven. Cool and add filling.
