

SCHOOL BOARD HITS AT RATES

'Phone Service Thought too High; may Take Matter to Commission

A complaint from teachers that two-party lines aren't the things for a school house, may lead to the local school board taking the public service commission why it should have to pay \$5 a month for a telephone on the same line on which a residence pays about half that sum. The problem has been presented to telephone officials, who are aware that brought reduction of price, school directors said.

Teachers and principals in the grade schools complain that the two-party lines should be abolished because they sometimes make for loss of time, and also because others may overhear conversation between teacher and parents which should be strictly confidential.

Check of Phones First
The matter was held over until definite facts are obtained, and until a check can be made of the number of times the school two-party line is used in comparison with the private residence line. Suggestions to take the problem to the service commission was made by Director E. L. Wieder.

The board voted to ask the city council to have Howard street, between Winter and Church, vacated during school hours. This street is used by Leslie school. At present teachers park their cars on the street, which means that there is little room left for the children to get across the road in safety at all times. The street is only 20 feet wide.

Mrs. Ella England appeared before the board to seek facts relative to transporting pupils from the Aumsville district.

Although not made a matter of record, some discussion was indulged over the matter of a janitor at Leslie school, who, members of the board admitted, is working longer hours than he should at the pay he is getting. An increase in pay was frowned upon, and it is probable an adjustment to decrease his work will be made.

The board authorized purchase of a \$24.53 filing catalog for the Parish Library, and \$360 worth of books for the grades and junior high school libraries. Dictionaries probably will be purchased later, and when this is done the book list will be cleaned up.

Mrs. Keene For Building

Mrs. Roy Keene, director, suggested that the board begin now a thorough study looking toward building program of the future. This will probably be undertaken, as sentiment was favorable. Supt. Hug says the demand which the board will face first on buildings will be of the high school, Englewood, Leslie junior high and possibly Highland.

Chairman H. H. Olinger drilled that a tightening up on fire drills be made and Director Frank Neer suggested a curb be put on high school students parking cars in the school alleys and driving rather heedlessly out to the main roads.

Railroads Admit They Can't Keep Up With Planes

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.—(AP)—Three important southwestern carriers told the interstate commerce commission today that they could not compete with airplanes and that lowered coach passenger rates would not wear riders away from buses and private automobiles.

Making known their intention to fight the plan of the St. Louis-San Francisco Railway Co. to cut coach fares to two cents a mile, the Missouri Pacific, St. Louis-Southwestern and Missouri-Kansas-Texas and the Texas subsidiaries of the latter two filed with the commission a protest and a request the rates be suspended and investigated.

The prices several weeks ago received permission to cut day coach fares from 3.5 cents to 3 cents a mile effective February 1. The plan was proposed, it was said, to meet bus and airplane competition.

START ROGUE FIGHT
Closing of the Rogue river and its tributaries to commercial fishing is proposed in a bill introduced in the senate Monday by Senators Miller and Dunn of Jackson county. A similar bill was enacted at the 1929 legislature, but the referendum later was invoked and it was defeated at the general election in November.

The house organization, is speaking Hamilton speaker last session, is head of the important committees on legislation and rules and taxation and revenue; Homer Angel of Portland retains his post as chairman of the ways and means committee; T. E. Andrews is moved up to chairmanship of the roads committee; E. C. Bronaugh and Allyn Byrnes also have important assignments.

While this house organization represents the carry-over from the "anti-revolution" days meaning before the Joseph revolt, it retained its power only by virtue of its engagements to Governor Meier that it would play ball and not try to obstruct the governor's program.

In the senate the change is apparent, yet its "lines of force" have thus far been determined by no "magnetic current". The most apparent thing is the wreck of the old Moser machine. Gus himself is back, and holds his post as chairman of the judiciary committee, but defenders and parts are missing from the well-oiled and smooth-running 1929 model. Al Norblad for instance, then president of the senate, is missing; likewise Milton Klepper of Portland who missed his train at an important junction on the legislative special. Harry Corbett, while not a cog in the machine, is a marked absentee and a distinct loss to the senate; but Multnomah county sends another distinguished citizen in the person of W. F. Woodward, who wears the only full beard and a beautiful white one, in either body. He gets an important place as chairman of the education committee.

There are some important shifts in position. Staples is no longer chairman of the ways and means committee, the job going to Burke, new member from Yamhill county. Joe Dunne is promoted to be chairman of the roads committee. Two years ago he would not have been trusted with this assignment because of his sponsorship for a time of measure to reduce motor tax license fees. The big change is for Sam Brown to be chairman of the committee on railroads and utilities. This is clearly in deference to Gov. Meier for whom Brown is senate leader.

With such change in the senate organization it remains to be seen how smoothly the body will function. With as many independent thinkers and ready speakers as Bennett and Brown and about 20 others the senate may become more of a debating body like the U. S. senate rather than a law-manufacturing machine.

The first critical days over, and the governor and the senate and house still on terms of amity, the remainder of the state may sit back on its chair and relax.

STOCK TRANSFER IS TIED UP BY COURT

A temporary injunction restraining E. C. Moffitt and the Sixty-Seven Petroleum corporation of Mt. Angel from transferring or disposing of 50,000 shares of the company stock until the suit filed in circuit court yesterday by H. B. Craig, is settled, was granted yesterday. Craig, in the suit, seeks accounting of partnership between him and Moffitt and asks that he be declared owner of 25,000 shares of stock.

The partnership which Craig alleges is supposed to have been formed last June 15, Moffitt coming in with him on the deal after Moffitt represented he knew oil lands and of possible oil properties in Marion county which might be leased.

In accord with the alleged agreement, the two obtained leases on 960 acres of land in the Mt. Angel territory, later forming the Sixty-Seven Petroleum corporation with Fred Schwab as president and Dr. E. V. Barnum as secretary-treasurer. The company sold \$100,000 worth of stock, out of which the 50,000 shares now in controversy are being held to turn over to Moffitt for organization and promotion. It is half of these shares Craig wants.

Another bill introduced in the senate would make it unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to place any advertising matter within a radius of 1000 feet of any county, state or any other highway. Streets in cities and towns having a population of 2000 or more persons are exempted from the proposed act. Advertising signs on private property abutting the highways must receive the approval of the state highway commission. This bill was prepared by Senator Johnson.

Pages appointed in the senate include Marjorie Vannice of Albany and Allen Dimond of Newberg. Other pages probably will be appointed later in the session.

HARRITT, 83, DIES AT HOSPITAL HERE

John W. Harritt, 83, 605 Union street, native Oregonian, died at Salem General hospital here last night. He was well-known here.

Mr. Harritt was born at Oregon City. On coming to Salem in 1891 he started a grocery business which he operated until 1907 when he retired.

Surviving him are his widow, Rachel Harritt; daughter, Mrs. Myrtle Lawrence of Salem; son, Frank B., of Eugene; and a sister, Mrs. Alice Emmett of Portland.

Funeral services will be held Thursday at 11 a. m. from the chapel of W. T. Rigdon and Son, with Rev. D. J. Howe officiating. Interment will be in the Odd Fellows cemetery.

UMATILLA BILL PASSAGE URGED

State Senate Memorial is Acted Upon Early as Hearing due Soon

being prepared by the attorney general and will be ready for introduction not later than Tuesday of next week, according to announcement made by Senator Bennett.

The bill provides that the primary election in the year 1932 shall be held on the second Tuesday of May instead of on Friday. In 1934 the primary election would be held on the second Tuesday in September instead of in May.

Senator Bennett said the change in the time of holding the primary election would eliminate several months of political activity on the part of candidates and make it unnecessary to print the pre-primary election pamphlet at a cost of \$14,000. All measures and statements by candidates for office would be printed in the pamphlet issued prior to the general election in November.

Right of Appeal
Two bills introduced by Senator Woodward have to do with appeals from municipal to circuit courts. Under the existing laws a person sentenced to serve one day in jail has the right of appeal to the circuit court. Under the Woodward bill an appeal would not be possible unless the sentence was for at least 10 days.

Provision also is made in the bill that in cases where fines are imposed it will not be possible to appeal to the circuit court unless such fines are at least \$50. It is now possible to appeal from a fine of \$20.

The Woodward bills were said to have received the approval of City Attorney Grant of Portland and many of the judges of municipal courts.

ASTORIA, Ore., Jan. 13.—(AP)—A bill raising the question of state aid for the Columbia basin project was being prepared to-night for introduction in the senate tomorrow or Thursday.

The measure was being drafted by nine senators, headed by Senator Voss of Spokane. It is backed by the Columbia Basin Irrigation league, Voss said.

The bill, Voss said, will provide for an appropriation of \$100,000 as an advance from the reclamation revolving fund. The money would be devoted to forming an irrigation district under the act of 1927, which was passed to apply to the Columbia basin project.

Land owners in the basin who met at Emphrata recently opposed immediate organization of the district, sponsors of the bill said, being especially adverse to organization under the act of 1927.
