## Today's Menu

Crabmeat Somerset, Ripe Olives, Vanilla Ice Cream, Swiss Sauce, Fried Potatoes, Fancy Candies. Crabmeat Somerset (Serving 12) 3 tablespoons granulated gelatin, 1/2 cup cold water, 2 cups boiling water, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons sugar, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1/2 cup chili sauce, 1/3 cup chopped sweet pickles, 1 cup finely chopped celery, 3 tablespoons chopped pimientos, 2 1/2 cups canned crabmeat, 1 hard cooked egg, sliced. Soak the gelatin and cold water 5 minutes. Add the boiling water and salt and mix well until the gelatin has dissolved. Add the sugar and lemon juice and stir. Cool. Fold in rest of ingredients and pour into individual molds which have been rinsed with cold water. Set in cold place to stiffen. Unmold on lettuce and surround with mayonnaise.

Cheese Biscuit 4 cups pastry flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 2-3 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup boiling water, 1 1/2 cups milk, 2-3 cups finely cut cheese. Mix the flour, baking powder and salt. Cut in the butter with knife. Mixing with knife, add the milk. When soft dough forms, pat it out until it is 1/2 inch thick. Spread half with the cheese and fold over the other half. Press in to the cheese and with a sharp knife cut into 1 1/2 inch squares. Place on a baking sheet and bake 12 minutes in moderate oven. Brush tops with butter and serve at once.

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## Bodies of Pair Found in River; Theory is Told

CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 20.—(AP)—The bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Suedmeyer, missing since Sunday morning, were recovered from the Muddy river near their home ten miles south of here Monday.

Suedmeyer, 25 and his wife 24, returned to their home from Corvallis about midnight Saturday. Mrs. Suedmeyer's grandfather who lived with them, told authorities. He heard them come home but Sunday morning when he found their 3-year-old son in bed and the parents missing he organized a search.

County authorities said they believed Mrs. Suedmeyer ran to the river to drown herself and her husband, attempting to save her, drowned with her.

BRUNSWICK, Ga., Jan. 20.—(AP)—Buster Day, 12-year-old negro golf caddy, bet another caddy ten cents he could stand on his head ten minutes. Buster kept his feet aloft for five minutes and then toppled over. He had ruptured a blood vessel and death was immediate.

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
