Of Funds Causes Difficulty

SCIO, Jan. 22.-Lack of availble funds was the reason given by the Linn county court a few days ago when it was stated the court could not at this time grant the request of a Scio delegation for a preliminary survey through Linn county for the proposed Casade highway.

Members of the court are said, however, to have heartily favored the proposed route through the county, which is calculated to connect Eugene and Oregon City by way of Coburg, Brownsville, Lebanon, Scio, Stayton, Silverton and Molalia. Members of the Scio delegation stated after the conference at Albany that members of the court expressed confidence that the highway ultimately would be constructed as a means of relieving the congested conditions of traffic on the Pacific highway and for the opening up of a rich territory along the Cascade foothills

east of the Willamette river. The proposed route has been termed the "high and dry" thoroughfare from Eugene to Portland, reducing the distance by 15 miles or more, according to the sponsors of the new highway movement. This matter had its inception in an organized and concerted form about three years ago. when Dr. P. A. Loar of Silverton was chosen president of the Cas-

cade Highway association. Gordon Taylor, then publisher of the Molalla Pioneer, and now a member of the lower horse of the Oregon legislature, was chosen secretary. An executive committee was organized, representing every county through which the proposed highway would run. Frank Bartu is the Sclo member and has been active in pushing the claims of the association.

Although the Linn county court cannot assist in a financial way this year, it is stated the court advised Scio advocates of the road to circulate a petition among 1 -terested farmers and others along the proposed route in this vicinity. to the end that the matter may a kept pending officially with the Linn county court.
