FAST COLLEGE TEAM ON BILL

O. S. C. Rooks Also to Show At Willamette gym in Program Tonight

If the Bearcats have lagged somewhat this season from lack of strong competition, there will be no occasion for it tonight when St. Martins college basketball team will meet at the Willamette gymnasium.

The preliminary game between the O. S. C. Rooks and the Willamette freshmen will start at 7:15 and the game between St. Martins and the varsity will start at 8:15. Both visiting teams are playing on the Willamette floor for the first time.

St. Martins is an outstanding team in the northwest. A number of the basketball players there will be at the University of Washington next year. The Irish Catholics have an especially outstanding center who is six feet three and has every qualification for a pivot man. Cardinal will have to extend himself to outjump this boy. It is understood that another one of the players on the St. Martins team will play for the University of Washington as a regular in the future.

Both Quintets and the Willamette freshmen are not so small either, being the largest bunch here in many years. "Les" Sparks also understands the art of putting a fighting team on the floor and the local yearling team is going to go.

Saturday night Willamette will play two games here, with the Barracks team from Vancouver, Wash., at 7:30, and the B'nai B'rith team, at 8:30. Coach Keene believes he has enough men to win two games in one night and he wishes to toughen his men for the stiff conference competition which will be met soon.
