

AGRICULTURE BILL PASSED

Senate up to Schedule; its Approval Given Road Appropriations

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—(AP)—Passing its third supply bill in as many days, the senate moved ahead of its legislative calendar today for the first time this session.

It gave its approval to the agriculture measure, carrying \$125,000,000 to become available immediately for road construction, and sent the bill back to the house for approval of amendments, just as it had the first deficiency bill and the interior measure.

Quick passage of the agriculture measure brightened the hopes of leaders of getting through with the necessary work confronting congress by March 4 and thus avoiding an extra session in the spring of the new and closely divided congress.

The bill provided \$214,000,000 for next year's operation of the agriculture department. The senate added to it about \$2,500,000 for relieving farmers in North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida and Alabama the funds repaid on loans in these states from the emergency flood fund of last year.

D. C. Dry Bill Comes Up Next

The agriculture measure is the fourth of the 11 regular appropriation bills the senate must dispose of before March 4. None of these has been sent to the White House, however.

Its passage cleared the senate's calendar of bills and opened the way again for general legislation. Senator Howell, republican, Nebraska, immediately sought to make his bill providing a drastic prohibition enforcement act for the next order of business. He encountered opposition from wets and dries who demanded that legislation relating to relief be given precedence, but the senate gave it the right of way by 39 to 29.

The house bill establishing a 41-hour week for postal employees stands next on the calendar arranged by the republican steering committee.

3 STUDENTS FROM SALEM ENTER U. O.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene.—(Special).—Among the new students at the University of Oregon this term who have swelled the total registration to a new high mark of 3266, are Philip H. Bell, Ellen Tower, and Frank E. Shaffer, all of Salem. Registration at this time last year was 3192, showing that in spite of the much talked of depression, there has been an increase of 74 in enrollment.

Bell is a sophomore in the school of applied science and attended the university last year. Miss Tower is a freshman in the English department and is entering the university for the first time. Shaffer, who has been on the campus previously, is affiliated with Phi Gamma Delta fraternity.

All three of these students are graduates of Salem high school. Fifty seven students completed their work at the university last term and received their degrees on January 20. Mildred Weeks and Carlotta Crowley, both of Salem, were among the students who received bachelor of arts and bachelor of science degrees. Florence Jones, of Salem, received a master of arts degree. A large proportion of the 57 students were not on the campus this year, but finished up their work through correspondence study.

CONVICTS RESCUED AS PRISON ABLAZE

WETUMPKA, Ala., Jan. 24.—(AP)—(Saturday).—Fire swept through one building of the Wetumpka state prison early today and caused the removal of several hundred prisoners, many of whom were women, but the flames were brought under control after a battle of nearly two hours.

There was no disorder, according to the county sheriff's office, and the prisoners were lined up in the yard of the institution. A check showed no lives had been lost nor were any injuries reported.

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DE BOE GUILTY ON ONLY ONE CHARGE

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 23.—(AP)—Daley De Boe, one-time secretary of Clara Bow, red-headed "it" girl of the screen, was convicted of one count of grand theft by a jury in Superior Judge William Doran's court late today.

The verdict came at the end of nearly 49 hours of deliberation after a compromise was reached by the jurors, eight of whom had been balloting for an acquittal and four for conviction. The jury was composed of seven men in seeking to convict the 36 year old woman.

The compromise was reached after the jurors twice had told Judge Doran that they were unable to agree and the state and defense counsel virtually had abandoned hope for a verdict. A provision of the compromise recommended to the court that clemency be exercised in passing of sentence which was set for next Monday, January 26.

On all of the 34 remaining counts, alleging that Miss De Boe stole from the bank account of the actress, the jury returned an acquittal. The count on which she was convicted involved a check for \$825, spent for the purchase of a fur coat two days before she was discharged from the actress' employ on November 1, 1930. The amount of money represented in the remaining counts was \$15,045.45, of which \$4,101.25 was alleged to have been spent for clothing, jewels and an automobile and the remainder deposited in Miss De Boe's personal bank account.

MISSING PERIOD IN HISTORY UNFOLDED

COLUMBUS, O., Jan. 23.—(AP)—An ancient book, depicting the early history of the Northwest territory (now Ohio) during the turbulent days of the late seventeenth century, has been found in an old family residence at Urbana, Ohio, according to an announcement today from the Ohio Archaeological and historical society. The book covers an eight-page gap in existing histories of the vast and wild territory from 1795 to 1803.

The book, in the hand writing of Winthrop Sargeant, later governor of the Mississippi territory, and other officers of the day, was written with a quill pen. It was donated to the Ohio society by John H. James of Urbana who found it among his ancestors' treasures.

Others who contributed to the history were William Henry Harrison, governor of the Indiana territory, and president of the United States, and Judge Charles Willing Byrd, first federal jurist in Ohio and forefather of the Byrds of Virginia.

WOODCOCK IS ILL ON NEW YORK TRIP

BINGHAMPTON, N. Y., Jan. 23.—(AP)—Colonel Amos W. W. Woodcock, national prohibition director, was taken ill after arriving here today to investigate prohibition enforcement in this area and the alleged bootlegging activities of Andrew J. Horvath. Horvath, president of the closed State bank of Binghamton, disappeared about a month ago. Shortage amounting to more than \$1,500,000 have thus far been uncovered at Horvath's bank.

Dr. Andrew S. Fritts described Colonel Woodcock as "seriously ill," with a temperature of 103 degrees. He said he had not determined definitely the nature of the illness, but it appeared some sort of a gripe infection. He said he had ordered the prohibition director to bed, and Colonel Woodcock must deny himself to all callers.

Colonel Woodcock's visit came after statements by Mrs. Mary Carter, president of the Broome county W. C. T. U., that "the largest bootlegging establishment in upstate New York had opened unobserved here for years," and that Lowell R. Smith, deputy prohibition administrator in the Syracuse district, was "unsatisfactory as a prohibition enforcement officer."

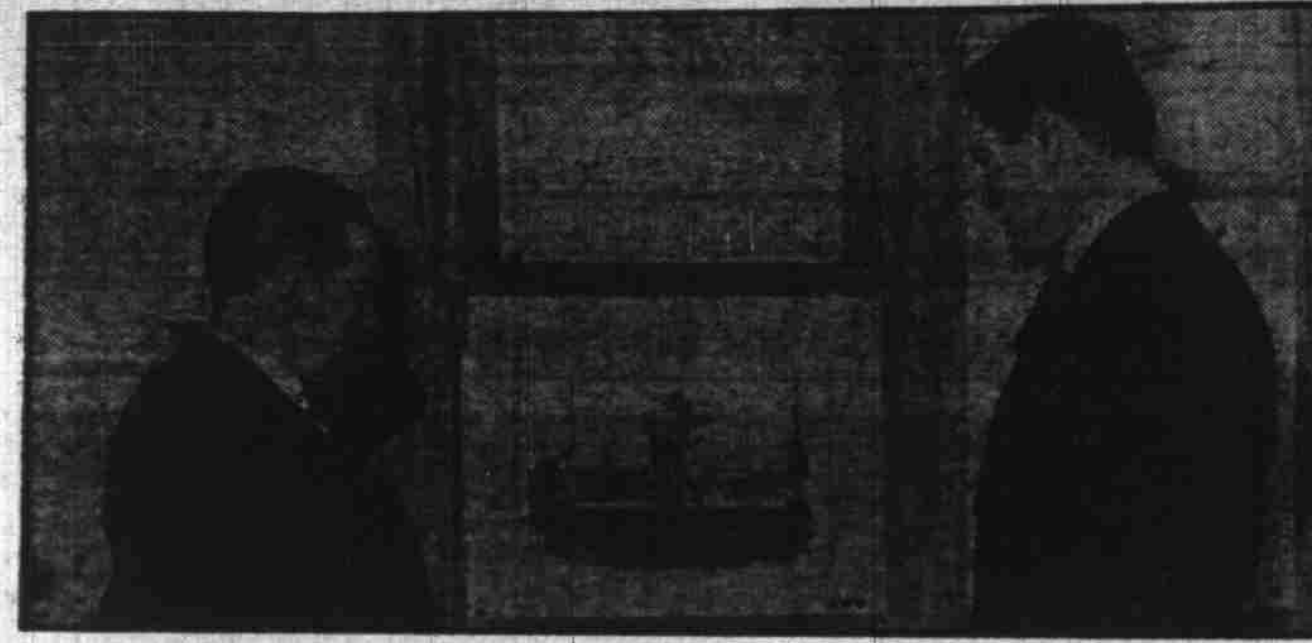

EXCLUSION ACT IS CAUSE OF FURORE

TOKYO, Jan. 24.—(Saturday).—(AP)—The question of Japanese exclusion from the United States, which was brought up in the house of representatives late yesterday, today resulted in stormy scenes during which Baron Kijuro Shidehara, the foreign minister, was shouted down by cries of "country's traitor."

The fireworks started during interpellations by Yosuke Matsuoka, one of the leading members of the Belyukai or opposition party. He quizzed Baron Shidehara regarding the relations of the United States and Japan on the matter of immigration and at one point asserted as a fact that during the London naval conference "America promised to modify the exclusion clause if Japan accepted the American proposals on disarmament questions."

The foreign minister attempted to reply but could not be heard in the general uproar.

CANADA-AMERICAN PROBLEMS VIEWED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—(AP)—An opportunity for a full and frank discussion of Canadian-American problems will be afforded officials here next week, to the arrival of Prime Minister R. B. Bennett of Canada, for a brief unofficial visit.

Emphasizing that the prime minister was not coming to the United States "on business" Hume Wrong, Canadian charge d'affaires, has advised the state department of the projected trip.

Department officials said tonight that no plans have been made for the entertainment of the distinguished visitor, but the stay in Washington probably will include an exchange of calls with President Hoover.

The projected trip, it was said authoritatively, is not in connection with any particular problem between the two countries, but follows out the premier's desire to visit Washington and see the Canadian legation here before the opening of Canadian parliament next month.

LAYTON SETS MARK AT THREE-CUSHION

CHICAGO, Jan. 23.—(AP)—Johnny Layton, the Sedalia, Mo., master of the ivories, established a new defensive record for a world's three-cushion billiard championship tournament here today by crushing Jess Jacobs, southern titleholder from St. Louis, 59 to 2 in 31 innings.

Layton's victory, the second in three starts, showed him into fourth place in the eight-man struggle for the title he has owned without interruption since 1928. STATE POLICE BILL IS BEING PREPARED

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 23.—(AP)—George Alexander, state prohibition commissioner, told the Oregon State Sheriffs' association here today that a bill which would create a state constabulary for Oregon is under preparation.

All police power and law enforcement would be placed under one head by this plan, Alexander said.

John Foote, Columbia county district attorney, told the sheriffs he would like to see establishment of an institution for youthful offenders who are too old to be sent to a reformatory but who should not be associated with "hardened criminals."

R. P. Bonham, district immigration director, urged education of the people on the "iniquities and purposes of communism." He also recommended giving the immigration authorities greater power to deport aliens.

Seeks to Slash Diplomacy Cost But Can't do it

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—(AP)—Entertainment expense for what he termed "high hatted high brow" in the diplomatic service were attacked in the house today by Representative Byrnes, democrat, Tennessee, as being undemocratic.

Chairman Temple of the house foreign affairs committee replied: "No entertainment, no business, with the foreigners."

Byrnes sought to strike out of the state department's annual supply bill \$125,000, pointing out that the sum could be used in feeding starving Americans in the drought area instead of foreign and well fed representatives. He lost, 88 to 62.

They Refuse to Shave Till Big Fund is Raised

VANCOUVER, B. C., Jan. 23.—(AP)—Men students of the University of British Columbia are going in for beards.

At a meeting of the men's undergraduate society today it was decided that none of its members will shave until the \$20,000 stadium drive goes "over the top."

As an added incentive it was suggested that the women students should refuse to "date" men who did not join the beard growers.

SEARCH FOR CASE WITHOUT SUCCESS

SPOKANE, Jan. 23.—(AP)—Eighteen planes unsuccessfully scoured much of east central Washington today, searching for Walter Case, Varney air mail pilot, unreported since yesterday morning.

Although some pilots said they feared Case had crashed in the bad lands around the Columbia and Snake rivers, Lieutenant George E. Hallett, a national guard flier, held hope that the airmail pilot had not crashed.

"It is my opinion that Case is ok," he said. "He is a heady flier, one likely to get himself out of any trouble he encounters."

Ten planes out of Spokane, including seven national guard and three Varney ships, carried on the search this morning, and were joined this afternoon by three Varney planes from Portland and five army ships from Pearson Field, Vancouver, Wash.

Leon Cuddeback, vice-president of the Varney Lines, came here at noon to take personal charge of the search.

Residents of Odessa, Wash., 75 miles west of here, reported they heard a plane in the fog before noon yesterday, and the planes flew in that direction. Other reports from Spokane bridge and Harrington districts, east and southeast of Spokane, sent ships there, but no trace of the flier was found.
