SPEAKING CONTEST TO BE FEBRUARY 13

MONMOUTH, Jan. 27.—The Oregon State Extempore Speaking contest will be held February 13 in the auditorium of the Oregon Normal school. Eleven colleges, including the three Normal schools are entitled to place entrants, under the following rules: One month before the contest occurs, the main topic will be announced to the participants so that they may read available material on the subject.

One hour before the speeches are to be delivered each contestant draws a sub-topical and is assigned, alone, to a room to prepare a speech on that subject. He may utilize any research material for study, but is not permitted to use any of it on the platform.

At the end of one hour the contestant is called to the platform and he speaks for 10 minutes with no notes.

No memorized material outside of 200 words of quotations may be used. The judges will be coaches of oratory from the participating colleges; who will rank each contestant except the one representing his own school. The winner will receive a prize of \$25.

Four students from the Normal will enter the contest.

MT. ANGEL PLANT WILL BE ENLARGED

Capitalization of Creamery To be Doubled is Report

SILVERTON, Jan. 27.—Silverton stockholders of the Mount Angel co-operative creamery attended the creameries annual meeting held Monday afternoon. Martin Rostvold of Monter and Ed Overlund of Silverton were the two directors whose term of office expired and these were re-elected. The directors who are holding over are R. J. Berning, Joseph Bern, Charles Boschler, and Frank Hettwer.

The organization voted to raise the capitalization of the creamery from \$25,000 to \$50,000 and the stockholders passed a resolution asking that all patrons become stockholders of the company. The patrons now number over one thousand and the trucks travel from the south of Clackamas county to the north of Linn county.

The financial report showed that the 1930 income was \$454,379.71. Of this butter sales was the biggest item, that being \$377,336.07. Powdered milk sales, one of the by-products of the plant amounted to \$42,246.39 and powdered buttermilk sales were \$7,453.89.

Manufactured butter amounted to 1,082,495 pounds during the past year; total butterfat received was 869,503.35 pounds; pounds of sweet cream butterfat

in milk and cream 71.70%, 423,454.67 pounds; 232,657.39 pounds of number 1 butterfat and 13,387.29 pounds of number 2 butterfat; 10,432,256 pounds of milk received. The average test of milk was 4.325%.

Statistics show that the volume of business in 1930 was \$104,040.80, and that 7,723,677 pounds of butterfat has been manufactured since the creamery was organized.

COURT DOCKET HEAVY AT DALLAS

DALLAS, Jan. 27.—The circuit court resumed its work here today upon the return of Judge Arlie S. Walker. The court had several cases lined up for this session but the cases brought up today were soon finished.

In the morning the case of the State vs. Martin and Archie Wilkinson was brought up. The two boys had been arrested on a forgery charge. Martin Wilkinson pled guilty to the charges and the case against Archie Wilkinson was dismissed.

In the afternoon the court settled a civil case of Polk County vs. Southern Pacific. The jury brought in a verdict giving the defendant, the Southern Pacific, the sum of \$1.00.

The court will take up the case against Archie Wilkinson on a non-support charge Tuesday morning.
