DEVICE INVENTED BY SMITH SUCCESS

A reducing valve which engineers and others have been trying to perfect for the last half century has been invented and patented by Lieut. Robert S. Smith, son-in-law of Frank T. Wrightman, deputy county sheriff employed in the tax collecting department, according to word received here.

The valve is not yet being manufactured, but the navy has contracted to use it on all its vessels. Several large condensa are being ordered for the business of manufacturing and marketing it.

Lieut. Smith is stationed at the navy yards at San Diego. He has been in the navy nearly 20 years, and has made quite a record. He is an engineer.

The valve which he has invented will reduce a pipe with pressure of as high as 200 square inches to 10 pounds, it is said.

Mrs. Smith will be remembered better here as Fay Wrightman.
