MUSIC SCHOOL ADDS COURSES

Willamette to Offer Full Instruction for Band, Orchestra Leaders

The music school of Willamette university will be strengthened and include several new courses according to Professor Cameron Marshall, head of the music department.

A readjustment of the music credits in relation to credits in the liberal arts department is being made. Formerly some of the liberal arts credits replaced part of the music credits required for a music major. This has weakened the music major in the past. Readjustment of the credits is an important step since it will allow time for a more thorough training in music.

An addition of courses in instrumentation is being added next fall to train leaders and instructors for band and orchestra work. These courses will be complete and standard in every detail, according to Professor Marshall. The present courses in public school music which include two year's work will have additions sufficient to cover four year's work in public school music. Several new courses will be added in this field and all the courses standardized.

With the establishment of the new courses in instrumentation and in public school music, Willamette's music department will be equal to that of any school in the northwest.

University Choir To Be Established

Another new feature next year will be the establishment of a university choir. This choir will be made up of members of both the men's and women's glee clubs for which credit will be given as well as all ensemble groups. Two major productions of the choir will be given each year as a part of the regular program outlined. The choir will combine the best voices in school and give added incentive to participation in the glee clubs.

Professor Marshall states that by next fall the men's glee club will have made its definite plans pertaining to the work in the Northwest association of the National Music League. At the present time University of Washington, Oregon State college and University of Washington are the only colleges in the northwest which have met the requirements and belong to the northwest as-

Other matters of particular interest in the school of music at Willamette are being worked out at present and announcements will be made concerning them in the near future. Professor Marshall has accomplished much here during the current school year. This is his first year here and through his efforts the improvements are being made. Further plans and arrangements in the school of music will rest until the return of President Doney, which will be about the middle of this month.

TITHING PLAN NOW REVIVED

Would Divert Funds Taken In by Departments to Reduce Deficit

A tithing bill, patterned after those of previous sessions, made its way into the senate yesterday. It was introduced by Senator Bennett of Multnomah county. The bill provides that money from certain self-sustaining commissions and boards in the state, up to 10 per cent, shall be diverted into the general funds to lower the existing deficit. When the deficit is gone, the amount obtained from the boards could either be refunded or discontinued by the state board of control.

From the tithing bill provisions, the highway commission, the state industrial accident commission and the higher board of education are exempted. The state game board is included. Bennett's bill provides a direct over-charge on all revenues from the departments. Senator Crawford's bill, on which a hearing was held Tuesday night, would turn in the total amount of funds to the general treasury for budgeting but provides no specific diversion of the funds to reduce existing deficiencies.

Drunk Drivers' Amendment Passed

The senate passed by a unanimous vote a bill introduced by Senator Eddy defining more clearly the terms of the so-called drunk drivers' act and providing that the revocation of the operator's license in case of either a first or second conviction shall be automatic.

The same overwhelming majority was accorded Senator Dunne's bill making it mandatory on state supported institutions to purchase Oregon dairy products rather than oleomargarine or other imitation dairy products. The bill was opposed
