Campbell Sets New Mark Of 245.7 Miles an Hour In Racing Car at Daytona

Players who Beat Huskies At Corvallis Picked To try it Again

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla., Feb. 5.—(AP)—Captain Malcolm Campbell, 46 year old British racing car driver, today established a new world's automobile speed record of 245.733 miles an hour on the sands of the natural beach speedway here.

Roaring twice over the course in his huge 1,450 horsepower Bluebird machine, he exceeded the previous record by 14.371 miles an hour and became the first man in the world ever to attain a ground speed of four miles a minute or more.

The previous record was 231 miles an hour, established here in 1929 by the late Sir Henry Seagrave, also of England, who later was killed in a motorboat accident at Lake Windermere.
