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waters of the Klamath basin, and for the purpose of this discussion to those of the Klamath river. It is evident that the legislature intended, in the enactment of this bill, and it would have the legal effect, to amend or supplement the provisions of 47-1201, Oregon code, to the effect that any water in said Klamath river covered by the notice of the federal government and not used by the government, may be subsequently appropriated in said river in the manner provided by senate bill 62, known as the hydro-electric water conservation measure.

"Also, in authorizing such subsequent appropriation by its very terms it does not authorize the acquisition of the right to use any of said water adverse to the claims of the United States. In this respect it clearly is not in conflict with any right acquired under section 47-1201 by the United States, but any appropriation made under the terms of said senate bill 62 will be subsequent and subordinate to the rights of the United States to the use of such water."

"Senate bill 315 therefore permits and authorizes the issuance of a license to use the waters of Klamath river below Keno which are unused or abandoned by the United States, while under the decision of the supreme court, senate bill 62 does not confer that right or privilege."

BANDIT CAREER IS ENDED IN FLORIDA

MILTON, Fla., March 6.—(AP)—A trail of banditry and terrorism that spread over 400 miles from the east coast of Florida to a swamp in the northwestern tip of the state ended here tonight at the Santa Rosa county jail with two men and two women locked in cells.

They were captured in the swamp near here today by a posse of two hundred men, many of whom had been trailing them since they started shooting their way westward from Jacksonville Wednesday night.

The men gave their names as Tex Hayes and Bert Oglesby. The women were registered as Mabel West and Fay Harris. All were non-communicative.

Dispatches from Springfield, Mo., said Hayes and Oglesby, both of Tulsa, Okla., led a jail break in which six men escaped January 27. Both are wanted on robbery charges at Springfield and Tulsa.

HOPE FOR PEACE IN PERU IS BRIGHTER

LIMA, Peru, March 6.—(AP)—Hope that peace was at hand in Peru, shaken by four revolutions in the past seven months, was expressed by the new junta of Gustavo Jimenez tonight after a sympathetic attitude was shown by the southern military leaders at Arequipa.

Followers of Lieutenant-Colonel Jimenez, who overthrew the five-day-old provisional junta headed by Dr. Ricardo Leoncio Elias by a surprise coup d'etat last night, conferred with representatives of the northern and southern forces today. While no official announcement was forthcoming of the support of the Arequipa group, a message from them to Jimenez led to the belief the southerners would line up behind the Lima government.

A telegram from Samanes Ocampo, leader of the Arequipa forces, welcomed Jimenez's manifesto proposing a speedy return of constitutional government. Ocampo had refused to support the Elias junta which came into power after a naval ultimatum forced the resignation of Lieut.-Col. Luis M. Sanchez Cerro as provisional president Sunday.
