Dallas—Notice has just been received concerning transportation for the council meeting of the General Federation of Women's clubs, which is being held in Phoenix, Ariz., April 7 to May 2.

Clubs in Oregon having paid their dues to the state federation may send a delegate to the meeting.

The certificate plan will be in effect entitling delegates to a one and one half fare ticket. Fare from Portland over the Southern Pacific line is \$78.51, lower berth \$34.50 for the round trip. From Salem the fare will be \$75.56 and the same price for berth. Tickets will be on sale April 22 to 28, with return date May 13.

By leaving Portland at 7:15 o'clock the evening of April 24, delegates will arrive in Phoenix at 10 o'clock Sunday, April 26. This same train leaves Salem at 9:08 o'clock.

The official headquarters for the council meeting will be the Westward hotel in Phoenix.
