CORVALLIS MAN ALL SET FOR JOB

With 24 hours notice, A. W. Lawrence, proprietor of a Corvallis printing firm, can be ready to take a state job under Governor Meier's direction, he announced this week in the Benton county city. Lawrence made his statement after being questioned regarding his possible appointment as a state industrial accident commissioner.

He said he had been approached by Governor Meier relative to the appointment. In 1912, when a member of the Malheur delegation in the house, Lawrence introduced the industrial bill which was drafted by James B. Kerr. At the present time, Lawrence's father is acting as a member of the correspondence department of the industrial accident commission office.

Lawrence said this week that if he was appointed he would continue his business in Corvallis, putting a man in charge there who operated the plant during the legislative session.

The salary of an industrial accident commissioner is \$3,000 a year.
