

Baker Defeats Tillamook in Hard Fought Game 28 to 21

PLAYS BENSON THIS MORNING

Teams Beginning to Show Fatigue; McKim is Winners' Star

At the end of a hard-fought game in which, nevertheless, the players on both sides showed much evidence of fatigue, Baker high qualified for the consolation semi-finals by defeating Tillamook 28 to 21 Friday night.

The diminutive Smith of Tillamook was largely responsible for putting his team ahead 9 to 6 in the first quarter, but Baker's more seasoned hoopers came into their own shortly thereafter, led 14 to 12 at half time and were never seriously threatened thereafter, though Smith continued to scintillate, with some efficient help from Naegli and Schilling.

McKim, hard working Baker guard, was the big cog in the key machine on the occasion, looping the hoop from everywhere for a total of six field goals. O'Neill followed him closely with four.

Baker will play Benson this morning at 9:30 following the Astoria-Jefferson game, both of these being consolation semi-finals. The winners will meet in the consolation finals at 7:30 tonight.

Ex-Chancellor Mueller Passes Away in Berlin

BERLIN, March 20.—(AP)—Hermann Mueller, twice chancellor of the German republic and leader of the revolution in November, 1918, died tonight after a prolonged illness.

The political leader's wife and two daughters were at the bedside when he died at 10:45 p.m. The 64-year-old statesman had been in a coma for hours and earlier in the evening his physicians had given up hope of recovery.

Herr Mueller, who headed the sixth and nineteenth post-revolution German cabinets, underwent operation on Saturday for removal of a bladder abscess and gallstones after several days of acute illness. His condition improved somewhat, reviving hopes he might recover, but he had a relapse Monday and steadily became worse.
