Permanent Lake—The Belmont Memorial lake, 500 feet long, 40 feet wide and eight feet deep, will be made into a permanent lake as well as an irrigation reservoir at the park. ELIZA M'GULLOUGH FUNERAL IS TODAY

WOODBURN, March 23—Funeral services for Mrs. Eliza McCullough, 89, who died at her home on Cleveland street, Saturday evening, will be held Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from the Masonic temple, under the auspices of the Eastern Star, with Rev. E. W. Strickland of the Presbyterian church delivering the sermon. Interment will be in Belle Pass cemetery, under the direction of Hall's mortuary.

Mrs. McCullough had been ill several weeks with pneumonia. Eliza Carley McDonald, wife born on October 24, 1841, at Carrickfergus, Ireland and was the daughter of Francis and Mary McDonald. She was married January 29, 1859, to Hugh McCullough and with her husband came to the United States in 1881, living first at Philadelphia, and later at Tabor, Iowa, and at Lexington, Nebraska. They came to Oregon in 1923, settling on a farm near Broadmead and have lived in Woodburn for the past 15 years. Mr. McCullough died September 23, 1917. There were 14 children born to this union, 9 of whom have passed on. The surviving children are Francis D. of Portland; Mrs. Lillian Jennings of Kelso, Wash.; Nathan, Arthur and Rebecca at home. There are also 13 grandchildren and 23 great grandchildren.

Mrs. McCullough was a member of the Presbyterian church and Aid society. The W. C. U. had been a member for more than 25 years of Evergreen chapter No. 41 of the Eastern Star and was particularly honored as being the oldest number of the chapter.

UTILITY DISTRICT INQUIRIES ARRIVE

Two inquiries with relation to the creation of utility power districts, as authorized under Senate bill 149, known as the strange district power bill, have been received by the new hydro-electric commission, according to announcement yesterday by C. E. Strickland, secretary.

One inquiry was received from R. J. Hendricks of Salem. Although he failed to give the location of the proposed utility district, Mr. Hendricks indicated that the application was now being prepared and probably would be filed within the next few weeks.

The city of Reedsport, in Douglas county, also has written for information. Waters of the Umpqua river are sought in connection with this proposed development.

The measure authorizes the creation of power districts, under the supervision of the hydro-electric commission, similar to the creation of irrigation districts, for the generation and distribution of power. The districts would be formed by vote of the people within the designated area. Five per cent of the qualified voters within a proposed district must file the preliminary petition before an election can be held.
