disinclined to execute orders from the central government.

"This act of insubordination was supported by political deportees, who on pleas of poor health, were allowed to take up residence at Madeira."

The statement said there were no repercussions in the Azores and that the government was strong enough to prevent any further disturbances.

Meanwhile, it was reported the gunboat Tamega, on duty at Funchal, had been turned over to the rebels by her crew.

In the emergency all leaves in the army and navy have been canceled. The loyalty of the Lisbon garrison is taken for granted, but there is some misgiving about the troops at Coimbra and Oporto.

duced \$400,000, while the county and state levy had been decreased \$127,000 since 1927. Judge Belts gave the Astor experimental station and the county agent credit for eliminating tuberculosis and abortion from the dairy herds.

A. G. Beals, prominent dairyman and ex-state senator from Tillamook county, said he had operated his dairy ranch in cooperation with the Astor experimental station and the county agent service, and that he had increased his production more than 75 per cent. He declared that the farmers and dairymen of Tillamook county were solidly behind the county agent service and the experimental station facilities.

Mark Johnson referred to cream grading as one of the outstanding results of the county agent activities in Clatsop county. He also lauded the Astor experimental station as a perpetual protection of the farm interests.

E. J. Dixon, manager of the Pacific Cooperative Poultry Producers association, declared that egg production in Clatsop county had increased rapidly during the past few years. He attributed this largely to the activities of the county agent service and the op-

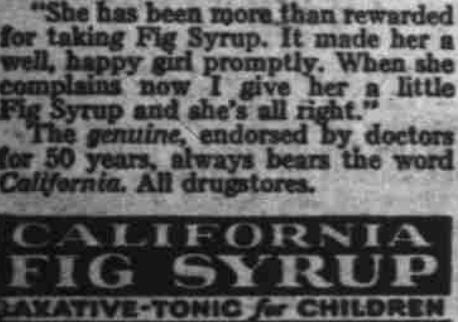

"Egg production had increased more than 60 per cent during the past few years," said Dixon, "and Oregon has now become an exporting rather than an importing state."

Governor Meier said he was interested in the problems of the farmer and dairymen. He referred especially to quality production and marketing. "This is where we are lacking," said Governor Meier. "I consider the work of the county agents commendable, and there is no reason why we should engage in personalities. My chief concern is in the prosperity of the rural districts. One trouble at the present time is that we use too many products from outside of Oregon."

Governor Meier let it be known that Mrs. Meier also had become interested in the use of Oregon products, and that she had been invited to go on the radio and tell other housewives about the agricultural resources of this state.

Other speakers included Warren Young of Columbia county, and E. E. Montague of Clatsop county.

Violence Marks Campaign Close In Kansas City

KANSAS CITY, Kas., April 6.—(AP)—Two trucks were partly destroyed in violence which marked the closing hours of the campaign for municipal offices in Kansas City, Kas.

Men carrying axes from two motor cars this afternoon and chopped to bits a loud speaker arrangement and other equipment on the truck promoting the candidacy of Robert E. Crowley for mayor.

A few hours later another truck bearing Crowley's banner burst into flames.

Brown Predicts Renomination Of H. Hoover

WASHINGTON, April 6.—(AP)—Renomination of President Hoover by acclamation in 1932 was predicted today by Postmaster General Brown on his return from a trip through the south where there have been recent reports of an anti-Hoover revolt.

The postmaster general, one of the president's closest political advisors, said he had conferred with republican leaders in a number of southern states and had found no evidence of substantial opposition to renomination of Mr. Hoover.

Lenin Instigated Nicholas' Death, Author Declares

NEW YORK, April 6.—(AP)—Ferdinand Ossendowski in a book entitled "Lenin, God of the Godless," to be published tomorrow by E. P. Dutton and Co., Inc., asserts that Lenin himself ordered the execution of Czar Nicholas II.

Ossendowski says that after the execution Lenin was called and his mind was at ease although "curses and prophecies of disaster from the whole world raged around him." The execution of the czar and his family, says Ossendowski, fulfilled the "only personal ambition" of Lenin's entire life.

Cross Will Mark Rockne Tragedy

New bids are to be submitted two weeks hence. Representatives of the bidding companies were called upon and each eulogized the machine he had for sale.

The bid of the Valley Motor company on a car for the chief was accepted. The amount was \$599.

Machine Builder Sees Prosperity Return For 1932

CHICAGO, April 6.—(AP)—C. W. Nash, automobile manufacturer of Kenosha, Wis., said today the middle west showed "definite signs of trade revival and should enjoy moderate prosperity by January 1932."

The Pacific coast has not felt the business slack which hit the east and middle west. Much of the population there is of the retired class, not dependent on current conditions for its expenditures.

"The automobile industry is showing more activity than during the past year. We are building sales gradually now rather than sensationally."

Indict Julian; Action Planned Against Boling

LAREDO, Tex., April 6.—(AP)—Indictments charging kidnapping, conspiracy to rob, assault with a prohibited weapon and carrying an unlawful weapon were returned by the county grand jury today against C. C. Julian, California and Oklahoma oil operator.

Julian, at liberty under \$15,000 bond, indicated he planned to take action himself against his accuser, Lamar S. Boling of San Antonio and Oklahoma, former publicity director for Julian.

The indictments here charge Julian attempted to rob Boling of \$50,000.

Boy Storm Hero Invited to Fly To See President

SEATTLE, April 6.—(AP)—Bryan Untied, boy hero of the recent Colorado school bus tragedy, was invited today to fly from Denver to New York and back on the United Air Lines by P. G. Johnson, president of the Boeing companies.

The thirteen year old boy was invited to use the service in connection with his visit to Washington, D. C., where he will be the guest of President Hoover.

Wrecked Train To "Get Even" Man Confesses

HENRYETTA, Okla., April 6.—(AP)—The desire of George Darnell, 33, section hand, to "get even" with the foreman who discharged him sent 13 persons to their deaths in a St. Louis-San Francisco passenger train wreck here August 18, 1929.

Darnell confessed in court today and pleaded guilty to a murder charge. He will be sentenced Wednesday. He became enraged when he was discharged, and "cocked" a rail switch on the outskirts of Henryetta. Burns the time he expected a freight to pass.

"Parlor, Bedroom and Bath" is the title of the play and it is a routine of wild leaps and grapping type of love making, in the course of which Natalie Moorhead gets her sophisticated half-dress all "messed up"; Charlotte Greenwood doing hysterically funny "leg exercises," a train incident in which a stalled Austin figures, and other mirth-provoking situations which kept the audience in an uproar Monday afternoon.

Keaton uses his old "poker-face" expression to bring laughs and his voice fits his expression; Cliff Edwards is a hotel porter and his specialty is wise remarks that never fail to bring a laugh; Charlotte Greenwood dresses to make herself an amusing as possible and then completes the picture with inimitable acting. To these three go the honors of the play and they deserve much.

There is a story plot upon which the play is hung, but the individual incidents are what make the play. The old style of over-acting, if that is an old style, is rather difficult to adjust oneself to, especially in the work of Dorothy Christy.

However, it is funny—and offers a complete change from the pictures which have been seen recently.

CHARGE REV. BROWN WITH RIDER DEATH

NEVADA, Mo., April 6.—(AP)—The Rev. J. A. Brown, 67, former Osark blacksmith, was blamed today by a coroner's jury for the fatal wounding Saturday of the Rev. George Rider, Kansas City evangelist, shot to death as the climax of his series of revival meetings at the Valley's Bluff nondenominational church.

Webster Hallett, county prosecutor, said he would charge the minister with first degree murder.

Hallett ascribed as a motive for the slaying, Mr. Brown's jealousy at Rider's success in recruiting a congregation divided before the former blacksmith resigned as pastor.

The coroner's jury inquired briefly into the fatal shooting at-tempting to determine if the evangelist was shot in Brown's home, where he had called to ask the former pastor to conduct Easter services. Mrs. Rider testified the men left the Brown home but that Mr. Brown followed, firing at the evangelist.

Mrs. Brown insisted he shot the evangelist when Mr. Rider resisted efforts to eject him from the Brown home.

Half-Year Check Mail Routes Now Getting Started

Semi-annual inspection of the city carriers' mail routes is now under way by Salem postal officials, and with but one route inspected each day, the work will require more than five weeks. There are 27 routes, and no inspections will be made Saturdays.

Finance Chiefs Exchange Ideas But Remain Mumm

WASHINGTON, April 6.—(AP)—The directors of financial policies of the United States and Great Britain exchanged ideas today about world wide business conditions. At the regular Monday meeting of the federal reserve board attended by Montagu Norman, governor of the bank of England, Secretary Mellon, Governor Meyer and other board members, and George L. Harrison, governor of the New York federal reserve bank.

Following his usual custom, Norman declined to discuss the conference. Meyer, however, said the talk centered around economic conditions, no concrete suggestions was advanced by the visitors, Meyer said. Details of the discussions were not made known.
