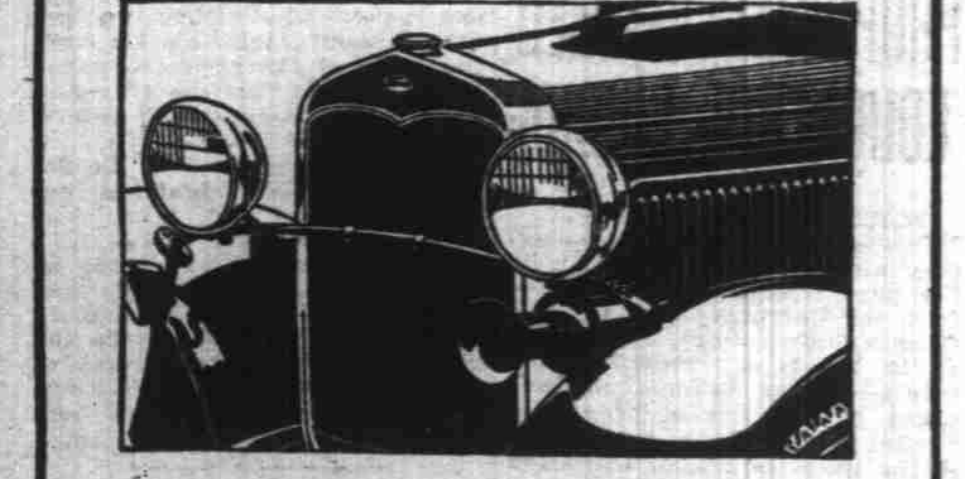
Grouping of the millage collected for education shows that the Salem taxpayer must budget 40 cents of every dollar he pays for educational purposes.

aged, and that there was unrest among the convicts in the institution due to an arbitrary reduction in their compensation.

The governor said it was up to the board of control whether the hearing would be held behind closed doors, or be open to the public and the press. Mr. Meyers demanded a public hearing, and urged that it be held without any unnecessary delays.

When entered the executive department a few months ago, said Governor Meier, "I found a deplorable condition in the state prison. The industry was mismanaged, there was padded payrolls and the industry was far in debt."

State Treasurer Kay, in replying to charges made by Governor Meier, declared that he had been in state service for more than 28 years, and during that period had been close in touch with all governmental functions.

"It is conceded, generally," continued Kay, "that the state penitentiary is being conducted more efficiently under its present management than at any time during the past 30 years. There have been fewer escapes, less trouble, and the funds have been conserved."
