CHURCH NAMES NEW MINISTER

Congregationalists Call Minnesota Man to Succeed Rev. C. E. Ward

The First Congregational church will not go long without a pastor, the pulpits committee having already sent through the congregation and had accepted a call to Rev. J. Rupert Simonds, of the Fairbairn, Minn., Congregational church.

If Rev. Simonds accepts, he is expected to arrive here July 1. He succeeds Rev. Charles E. Ward, for six years local pastor, who leaves May 1 for Forest Grove to fill a charge there to which he was chosen more than a month ago.

Members of the congregation are enthusiastic over the record set by Rev. Simonds, a graduate of Yale and of the Bangor Theological seminary. He was ordained for the ministry in 1913 and served as pastor for four years at the South Britain, Conn., church while at Yale, and was also pastor at Branford, Conn., and Camden, N. Y., besides Fairbairn, where he has been eight years.

Rev. Simonds, age 41, is a Mason, a Rotarian, member of Phi Beta Kappa at Yale, has been area commander for the south central Minnesota, Boy Scouts, was for seven years on the state conference department of religious education, has taught in church summer conferences and has been conference moderator of the St. Paul association. He is a native of Vermont, as is also Mrs. Simonds. She is a graduate of Brown university. They have no children.

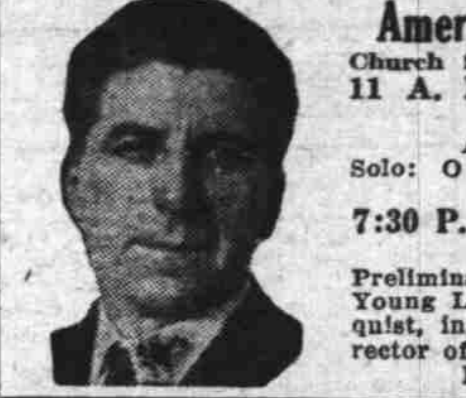
Following the election, the fourth quarterly conference and annual meeting will be called to order by Rev. M. A. March, district superintendent.
