Willamette university stoned somewhat for two defeats last year at the hands of Columbia university's baseball team by grabbing the first of a two game series from the Irish Friday on Olinger field by a 4 to 1 score. The two teams meet again this morning at 10:30 on Columbia's diamond.

The game resolved itself into a fielders' duel as neither pitcher registered a large number of strikeouts, but gave the batters poor balls to hit which paved the way for many putouts on first and several double plays. Pete Gretsch pitched for Willamette and worked a nice game. Gretsch got five strikeouts, four of these when he had allowed himself to get into tight places. Herman, Columbia chucker, registered only two strikeouts and was touched for 12 hits. Gretsch allowed but six hits.

Willamette scored twice in the third inning when Adams walked and Gretsch and Zeke Girod each doubled. Again in the fourth inning a pair of singles and a pair of doubles brought two runs to the Bears' scoring for the day. Willamette lost a chance to score in the eighth when Gribble was called out for missing third after he had crossed the home plate in apparent safety.
