BUTTER MART FIRM AT OPENING CANADA NEWS AIDS GRAIN PRICE

Weather Lowers Meat Prices but Aids Vegetables

PORTLAND, April 27.—(AP)—Wholesale butter market started with the new week in firm position with limited volume of early receipts readily taken up with sales to retailers at steady quotations.

Warmer weather produced a draggy effect on demand for country dressed meats and poultry but prices were quoted barely steady on all lines excepting spring lambs which dealers found necessary to mark down 2 cents to 16 cents a pound, nearer the lower price levels of competing meats.
