Wheels of the car spun in the road as the car was stopped, so it was impossible to get a clear impression of them, it was said.

Members of the Iverson family strongly discredit one story that the murderer may have been a man whom the slain officer was instrumental in sending to the penitentiary. This man, then about 50 years old, would be 70 years old now, as that incident occurred 20 years ago, they say.

Claim of many Silverton persons that Iverson must have been shot from behind a signboard across the street from where the murder took place has been discredited by officers, who say that this was practically impossible. Officers spent some time investigating this possibility.

SILVERTON, May 5—Many residents of Silverton and vicinity turned out to pay honor to this city's murdered policeman, James Iverson, at the funeral today and the Jack and Ekman chapel was filled to capacity and the crowd overflowed far out into the street.

Dr. W. S. Gordon of Silverton officiated, Rev. Thomas Hardie, former minister here and a close friend of Mr. Iverson, being unable to come as was planned.

Mrs. W. S. Tate sang with Mrs. Edson Comstock as accompanist. Pallbearers were Mayor Eastman, George Hubbs, George Steinhilber, Otto Legard, Ernest Starr and Charles Reynolds. The body was taken to the Portland Crematorium.

LEWISTON, Ida., May 5.—(AP)—A fire of unknown origin in the business section tonight destroyed two buildings and was believed to be burning in another, causing a loss estimated by owners at \$175,000 at least.

Pleasant Martin, fireman, was badly cut by a falling plate glass window and at least 12 others were overcome by smoke.

The Fashion Boot shop and the F. W. Woolworth company's store were destroyed, and it was believed the blaze had eaten through into the Salsberg building, a two-story office, book and clothing store building.

# TILLSON HEARD IN LECTURE RECITAL

### Former Local Musician is Pleasing in Music Week Feature

One of the loveliest of concerts presented during national gold music week was the lecture-recital given in the attractive residence studio of Professor and Mrs. T. S. Roberts on North Summer street, when Edward W. Tillson, pianist, was again presented to Salem music-lovers. Mr. Tillson is a former Salem musician, having been a member of the music department of Williams college, and is again planning to establish his home in the capital city, assisting Mr. Tillson on the program was Sael Polinovsky in a group of violin numbers.

Mr. Tillson was introduced by J. M. Clifford, president of the Salem Arts League, sponsor for the evening's musicals.

Mr. Tillson opened the program with a brief descriptive lecture, in which he explained the various movements interpreted in the group of numbers to be played during the evening.

Beethoven's "Sonata" was the first number to be played by Mr. Tillson. He immediately captivated his audience by his superb execution and fineness of piano technique. His magnetic touch won for him a hearty approval, which was shown by an insistent call for encores.

Outstanding in the evening's concert was the Scherzo in B flat minor, by Chopin, which far exceeded the other interpretations. In this number Mr. Tillson showed remarkable fullness and development of technique, which was brought out by the powerful and vibrant minor tones.

Paul Polinovsky gave a group of violin numbers which brought a warm response from the audience. Mr. Polinovsky's "Cansons-etta" by d'Ambrosio, was his outstanding number.

After the concert the group was left to enjoy an informal reception. Those assisting included Mrs. J. M. Clifford, Mrs. Richard Cartwright and Mrs. Blanche M. Jones.

# CHINA PHEASANTS TO BE RELEASED

To give impetus to the hunter's delight and increase his luck, Marion county Game Protective association will release 3950 China pheasants in the late summer and early fall. It was announced at the group's regular meeting in chamber of commerce rooms last night.

And for the fisherman, the sportsmen's group is planning to stock the lakes in the north of the county with bass, to be taken from the ponds of Sauvie island, where great schools of the fish are impounded at low water.

The pheasants, hatched on the state game farms at Corvallis, will be taken when one-third grown to pens at Mt. Angel, Silverton, Woodburn, Aurora and Salem, also to Kikness, and there raised to maturity. The game association last night decided that all China hens should be retained in the pens until after the hunting season.

Mention of possible organization of a federation of the various game associations and leagues of the county was made and considered at last night's meeting. It was stated such a scheme might be carried out within the present month.
