Costumes of the sixteenth century are worn with more joy by these actors and actresses of the little theatre group than the modern clothes into which they change following rehearsals.

A Shakespearean stage is now under construction in the Capitol theatre where the play will be presented Thursday night. It is a duplication of the old Globe theatre in London. It has two stories and many wings and curtains so that no waits occur between acts. As soon as one act is concluded two little curtains draw one curtain and raise another and the show goes on.

Ralph Schomp, art director for the play, has painted all the richly colored tapestries and curtains which will be used in the production. Just now Miss Sally Lansing and Mrs. Edna Reed are very busy completing costumes which had to be made to take the place of several lost by fire Friday night.

James Beard, director of the play, announces a complete rehearsal for Monday night at which time Ted Osborn, of the Duffy players, will be present to take his part as Iachimo. Mr. Osborn and Mr. Beard are the only members of the past who is not local talent.
