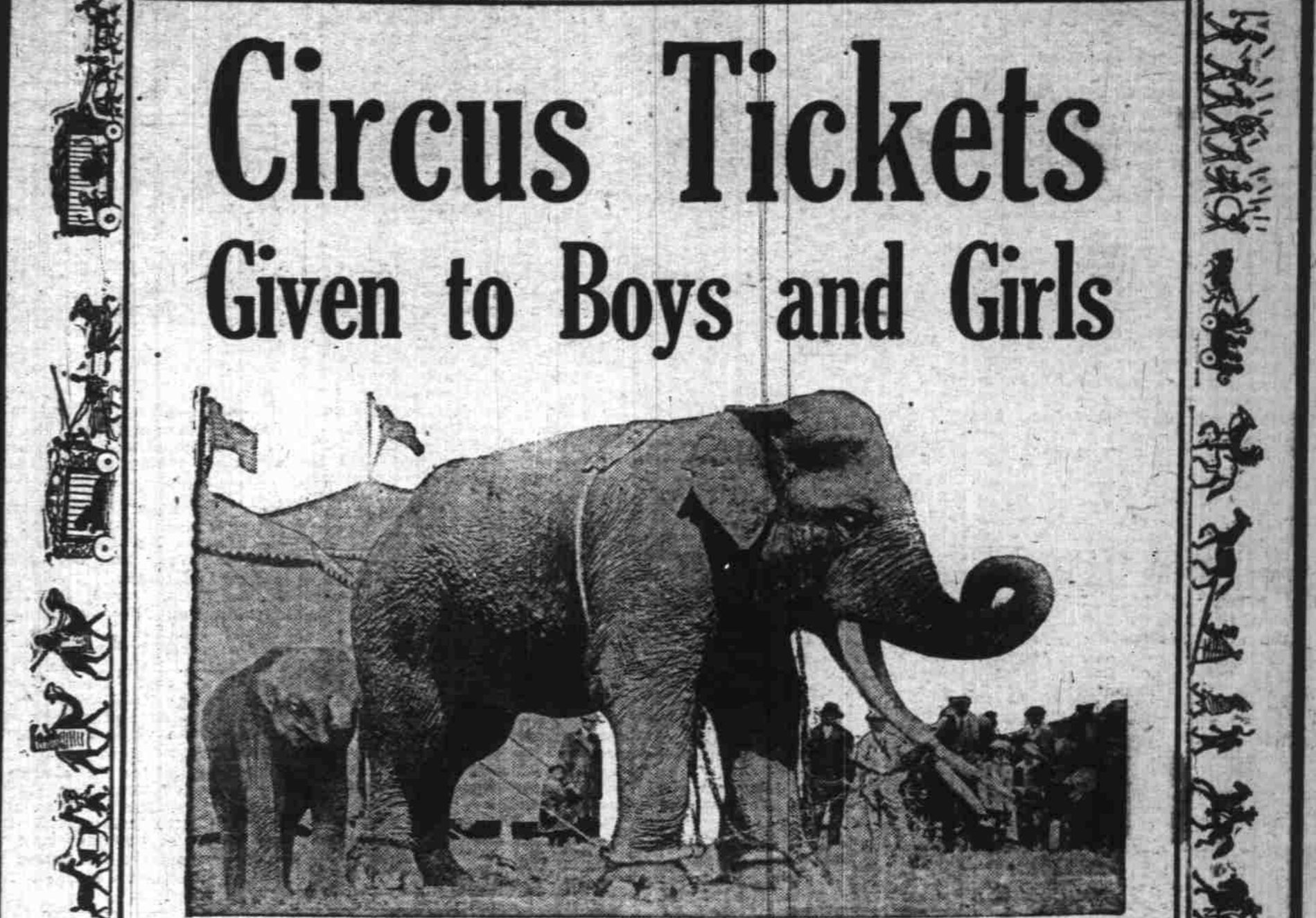
Auxiliary Plans "Homecoming"
