## ROCK HOUSE TRIP CHEMEKETAN PLAN

The trip to Mary's Peak which the Salem Chemeketas were to take this week end with the Eugene Obsidians has been postponed. A member of the Obsidian club scouted the trail and reported that the road is impassable. As a substitute the Chemeketas will be led by Ray Miller to the Rock house above Ellendale.

Hikers will leave the Y. M. C. A. promptly at 7 o'clock Sunday morning and drive to the Ellen-

dale rock crusher. They will then hike to the Robb mill at the head of Smith creek and follow the forest service trail to the Rock house. This is a large rock cave in which a fine mountain spring is located. From this point an excellent view of the Falls City and Black Rock districts may be obtained.

Most of the hike is along a wooded trail and will be for a distance of approximately 13 miles. Each hiker is asked to bring a trail lunch.

On Memorial day the Chemeketas will go to Seaside and hike around Tillamook Head. This trip will occupy the entire week end, the hikers leaving Salem Saturday morning and returning sometime Sunday.

Occurrences and Gossip at the center of Oregon's state government

**JACK MEIER**, son of Governor Julius L. Meier, entertained Major-General Smedley D. Butler at dinner at Eugene last night. Butler went through Salem on his way to Eugene, accompanied by Major Dutton and George W. Joseph. He will return here today after a short visit at Corvallis. It is expected Butler will be in Salem today and tomorrow for the major portion of the time.

General Butler is receiving considerable mail through the

governor's office here, which he states mostly includes applications for jobs in the Oregon state police. Such applications have also been received from all parts of the United States by Hal E. Hoos, secretary of state, and by the governor.

Oregon's state executive played the role of a proud grandfather yesterday when he met the Shastas carrying his two grandchildren to the governor's home on the Columbia river highway. Mr. and Mrs. Fred M. Gans and two children, arrived in Portland from San Francisco and will spend some time with Mrs. Gans' parents, Governor and Mrs. Julius L. Meier.

Jimmy Rowe, with the United Press bureau in Salem for about a year, has been transferred to Olympia, where he will work in that bureau. He was here yesterday from Portland to obtain his possessions, and left for Olympia. Dennis Landry, in charge of the bureau here, expected another assistant in a day or two.

Arthur W. Lawrence, of the state industrial accident commission, left for Eugene yesterday to spend several days on business for the office. Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer, was in Portland yesterday where he attended a dinner for General Butler. Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, will leave for John Day today on business. He will be gone several days. James Mott, corporation commissioner, was in Portland yesterday.

Many persons here plan to attend the Rogue River bridge dedication at Grants Pass Saturday. Many confuse this bridge with the \$600,000 one at the mouth of the Rogue river, near Gold Beach. This bridge will not be completed until next year. The bridge at Grants Pass is a smaller one.

Max Gehlar, new director of agriculture, whose office is effective July 1, is here on a job to get a good share of the time. He has his temporary office in the state budget director's quarters, across the hall from the governor's office.

Sam Koser, known as the third oldest state office holder in length of service, who recently resigned as budget director, is a candidate for the position of inspector for state institutions to ascertain to what extent families and estates of inmates can pay for their support. The position is an appointive one by the board of control and was created by the last legislature.

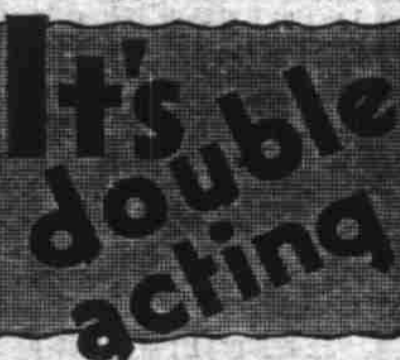
## Freedland Here As Employe For Capitol Theatre
