## SWIMMERS ARE GIVEN BUTTONS

Beginners who Learned art in Present Campaign Get Recognition

Beginners' buttons were given to 33 boys and girls by Judge George Rosman recently for accomplishing the feat of jumping into water over their heads, swimming 25 feet and then swimming back. A large number, fully three-fourths of the 413 boys and girls who signed up for swimming in the Red Cross Y. M. C. A. campaign, learned to swim. Many of these can swim 300 feet.

Of the 413 who signed up, 323 were girls and 190 were boys. Charles Gill has been instructor for the classes, which have been meeting since May 12. Those who earned buttons are urged by the Red Cross to return next week for the advanced lessons. The advanced swimming lessons will take place every day between and including May 26 and June 8, except May 27, 28 and 31.

The swimmers' schedule is as follows: Boys, 12 years and up, 4 to 4:30 o'clock; girls, 12 years and up, 4:30 to 5 o'clock; junior life savers, 12 years and up, 5 to 6 o'clock; senior life savers, 17 years and up, 6:30 to 7:30 o'clock; adult beginners, 7:30 to 8 o'clock, and adult swimmers, 8 to 8:30 o'clock.

Many inquiries about the adult beginners group have come to the Y. M. C. A. and Red Cross headquarters.

It was alleged that the diversion would deplete the waters of the Metolius river and injure the fish life.

The protest was signed by Ralph Cogswill, engineer for the utilities commission.
