NANCY BELLE DIES AGED 74; PIONEER

Born Near Oregon City in
1857; Funeral Will
Be on Monday

Funeral for Mrs. Nancy S. Belle, 74, who passed away at noon yesterday at the family residence, 204 North Church street, will be held Monday at 10:30 a.m. from the Rigdon chapel. Rev. W. C. Kaestner will conduct the services and interment will be made in the Odd Fellows cemetery.

The death of Mrs. Belle marked the passing of another from the ranks of Salem pioneers. She was born near Oregon City February 16, 1857, the daughter of Charles and Lucinda Swegle, pioneers of 1854. Mrs. Belle remained a lifelong resident of Oregon.

Mrs. Belle is survived by her widower, Henry S. Belle. They celebrated their golden wedding anniversary four years ago. Children surviving are Claude S. Belle, former proprietor of the Gray Belle, Mrs. Charles E. Strickland, and Gene Belle, all of Salem. Two granddaughters, Thelma LaBelle Young, who made her home with her grandparents, and Nancy Jean Strickland, also survive.

One sister, Mrs. William Kitchen, preceded Mrs. Belle in death, dying last December in Ocean Park, Cal. Surviving brothers and sister are William Swegle of Walla, Wash., George Swegle and Albert Swegle, both of Washington, and Mrs. J. W. Johnson of Tacoma.

HAMILTON HAWLEY DIES IN MIDWEST

That William Hawley, native of Polk county, member of a well-known family there, died at Rochester, Minn., Tuesday, May 26, was the word received by Portland and Stayton relatives. It was thought Mrs. Hawley would bring the body of her husband to Bethel for interment in the old family cemetery, possibly with funeral services being held there at 11 a. m.

Mr. Hawley was born at Bethel July 17, 1864, the son of J. H. and Eliza Hawley. There he spent his boyhood. He became cashier of the First National bank at Independence, which position he held for 10 years. Then he moved to Fondleton, where he was married to Miss Josie Danner. A few years later he moved to Judith Basin, Mont., where he engaged in large scale farming until death overtook his labors.

Surviving Mr. Hawley are his widow, who was with him at the time of his passing; a brother, Luke M. of Buffalo, N. Y.; two sisters, Mrs. B. F. Mulkey of Portland and Mrs. H. A. Boschamp of Stayton. He was a brother of the late Curtis L. Hawley, who represented Polk and Benton counties in the state senate at several sessions and who died while holding the office of state dairy and food commissioner. Mr. Hawley was familiarly known to his Oregon friends as "Ham" Hawley.

experiment, came a second, the refusal of his own people's party's electoral college to send 20 independents to the new parliament.

Defeat produces a Gai more silent than ever. His loss of horses, farming, and poker faded out during two years' absorption in ancient Turkish history. Now he is an enigma even to the officials who are nearest him.

A group of them, waiting at the Ankara station a solid three hours for an orator to bring him back from his Anatolian tour, were overheard discussing the expected forthcoming autumn election. The Gai arrived.

Thirty minutes later, ministers, deputies, all of Ankara's highest, were bowed over by Kemal's announcement that parliament should be immediately dissolved and elections immediately begun.

He is a patriot, everybody agrees, but what turn his patriotism will take next is a matter for speculation. One evidence of a tightening of the reins is his projected reorganization of the foreign service, requiring every Turkish ambassador and minister to spend six months of every year in Ankara.

Another picture shows Kemal today in contrast with the Kemal of a few years ago in decked official Ankara in frockcoats, top-hats, and other western paraphernalia. The picture shows the Gai chatting with a fashionable Ankara wedding with a small group of guests clad in rough home-spun and shod in gawky boots; straight-from-the-soil Anatolian farmers. Kemal appointed deputies in his new parliament.

He wants their ideas on Turkey's agricultural improvement; and he has given them none of his own on clothes.
