

BOISE ESTATE MAY GET LAND

Board of Control Seeking
To Turn Over "Model
Farms" on Claim

Three model farms, acquired under the administration of the Oregon land settlement committee, Thursday were ordered transferred to the Whitney L. Boise estate, in payment of preferred claims of the estate amounting to approximately \$14,500.

The farms were established in the year 1919 and are located at Independence, Roseburg and Ochoco. It was brought out at a meeting of the board of control Thursday that these farms had cost the taxpayers of Oregon approximately \$75,000. The land settlement commission was abolished at a previous session of the legislature, and the board of control was directed to dispose of the farms at the best advantage to the state.

It has not been determined whether the transfer would be accepted by the Boise estate. Plowden Stott, Portland attorney, who appeared for the estate, indicated that the proposal was not satisfactory to him, but that he would present it to the heirs for their consideration. Besides the preferred claims the estate has approximately \$7000 unsecured claims against the farms.

To Be Considered
The latter claimants would have to deal with the Boise estate in case the proposal of the board of control is acceptable. It was said the financial disaster in connection with developing and operating the farms was due to depreciation of equipment, poor judgment in their operation and decline of market prices.

The value of the Independence farm was placed at \$7500, as compared with a capital outlay of \$19,500. The Roseburg farm was appraised at \$600, as against a \$24,000 outlay. The farm at Ochoco was estimated to be worth anywhere from \$1500 to \$2000, as against an outlay of \$17,000. L. C. Rullison, who has been in possession of the Independence farm for seven years and has expended \$2500 of his own money in its improvement, appeared before the board and protested its action. He said he was instructed to deal with the Boise estate, as he was said to have no legal claim against the state.

DANCING PROGRAM PLEASES AUDIENCE

Barnes Pupils Betray Real
Ability at Local Theatre
Stage Appearance

A program of amateur dancing which moved swiftly with no waits between numbers, which had no confusion in evidence, which had inspiration and verve and dash, which had color and character, and which was backgrounded by music that took hold of both the audience and the dancers, was that presented by the students of the Barnes school of professional dancing Thursday night at Warner Bros. Elsinore theatre.

An audience which packed the theatre from main floor to gallery gave vent to spontaneous applause in the midst of more than one number and responded with long and sincere applause at the end of every act. And it was little wonder. The work presented was given with a joy and spontaneity which gave back to one the belief that there is a reason for dancing after all. A feeling which gets very nearly smothered out after a few doses of present day vaudeville or a few big screen revues.

For the most part those taking part were very young and they were dancing for fun, not for money. The dance "Dutch Love," done by Billy Snyder, Zelma Luthy and Augusta Nordturt, was a good example of the carefree and happy vein of the whole revue, as well as of its excellent finish. "Bridge the Gods."

Don Schaupp as a solo dancer in the interesting and splendidly artistic dramatic dance interpretation of the "Bridge of the Gods," arranged by Barbara Barnes, did a splendid piece of work. The whole story as told by dancing was splendid and was completed by beautiful stage settings and costumes and lighting effects. The old presentations of Fanchon and Marco were outdone in this dance drama.

The artistic work of Josey Aklia and Blanche Lowell Gripenberg was outstanding; and the tiny Patty Fish as a jack-in-the-box quite captivated the audience. Joyce Chambers, who has always brought much credit to herself as dancer, shows excellent improvement this year.

And the "petite circus" is charming. Little people doing with happy wholehearted joy the dance of circus fun fairly work their merriness into the hearts of the audience.

It is an amateur revue but it far outshines many a one given in the name of professionalism. The revue will again be presented tonight at 8:30 o'clock in the Elsinore.

number is actually two. He does buy a good many ties, handkerchiefs and socks, and they always match.

EXTREME politeness with men, gallantry with women is his unflinching rule. In the campaign last fall when he defeated Ruth Hanna McCormick by more than 700,000 votes, he always referred to his opponent as "the lady" and when he found it necessary to criticize the enemy, he pointed out that he was sure "she was being led astray."

He carries his chivalry into his daily contacts, into the street, the office building, the country store. He speaks to persons he has never seen before, stops a gang of workmen in the middle of the street to shake their hands, holds up an entire campaign party while he chats with a little farm girl. Many of his private letters are ended: "I pray you feel free to command me for any service in my power."

He was once an instructor in Latin and Greek; he speaks French and German well, and knows enough Flemish, Spanish and Swedish to greet audiences in their native tongues.

He was a colonel in the Spanish-American war and wears a uniform now whenever occasion permits. Walking and riding constitute his exercise. He walks the mile and a half from his hotel to his office whenever the weather permits. On vacations he rests, reads and rides.

His wife, Mrs. Rose Douglas Lewis, writes a society article for a Chicago newspaper every week and tells fortunes for friends and benefit bazaars. Because of the latter activity, Senator Lewis always calls her "Gypsy." When they are not together he telegraphs her every night.

He does not dislike the nickname "J. Ham," but thinks it too undignified for use in certain places. He once made formal protest on the floor of the senate.

He enjoys a good joke on himself and does not hesitate to tell it. He was once in a Washington hotel dining room with his wife when he found he had mislaid his spectacles. He asked the negro waiter to read the menu to him. "Ah, my sorry," was the reply. "My education was neglected too."

Culverts Will Be Constructed By Road Crews

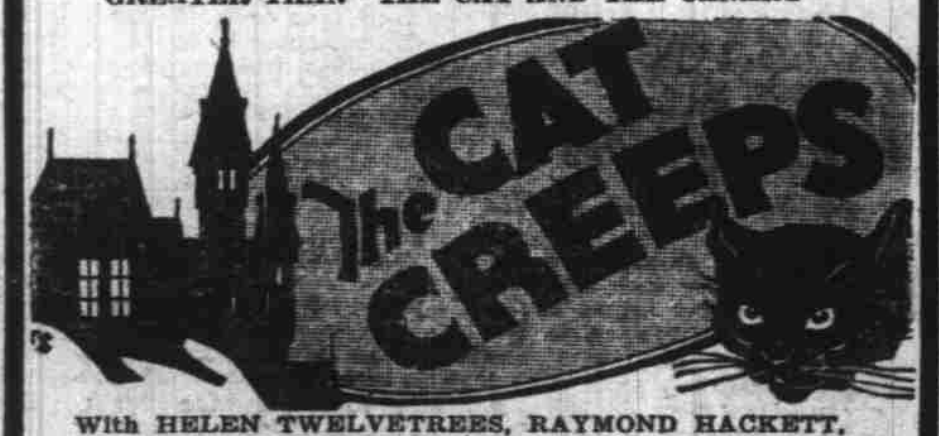

theoses Fitzwater and Moltzner directed their stock salesmen within the last few weeks to continue to promote the sale of stock, telling purchasers that the Guardian and the Mortgage Investment company was in a sound and prosperous condition and that on July 1, 1931, it would declare and pay a dividend.

Large deficits appear in the balance sheets of the other affiliated companies in Portland. Mott said, but these are not of the size of the questionable assets of the Guardian company. Mott has given the Mortgage Investment company 20 days in which to restore its advances to the Guardian and he regards it as highly improbable that this can be accomplished.

Mott said his investigations to date made it certain that in the future much more extensive and detailed investigation and supervision must be made by his department of savings and loan and bond companies operating in the state. He said yesterday that he would insist hereafter that all their investments be subject to periodic inspection.

WOODBURN HOME DESTROYED BY FIRE

WOODBURN, June 4—Fire, said to have been started by defective wiring, partially destroyed the home of Antone Krupka on north Second street Wednesday afternoon.

The fire apparently started in the back end of the house and had a good start by the time the fire department arrived. The fire was centered in a wood shed at the back of the house and in the second story of the house itself. Although most of the furniture was saved, the house was badly damaged by water.

The generally accepted theory is that the fire started by defective wiring, but the fire seemed to have also centered about a chimney. The fireman experienced quite a lot of difficulty in getting the fire under control, as much of the company's hose was drying when the fire broke out.

John Barrymore in "Svengali", now showing at Warner Bros. Elsinore, is quite the best of his vitaphone interpretations, according to my estimation. And he has with him as his leading lady, Marian Marsh, who plays for her first real screen appearance the part of "Trilby" in the play and does it in remarkable manner.

Not only does this novice of the screen play remarkably well but she is remarkably pretty and young, and she has the added appeal of the unsophisticated sweetness of a child, an unusual combination for the screen. She is very blond and has a rather husky voice. It is interesting to note in the progress of the play that the admittedly great Barrymore has the center of attention taken from himself more than once by this little newcomer to the screen whom he himself picked as the

only possible person to play the part of "Trilby".
Another interesting person in the play is Bramwell Fletcher, youthful English actor who will be remembered as the unsuccessful suitor for the hand of George Arliss' daughter in "The Millionaire". He has a splendid voice, and his acting is quite correct, perhaps too obviously so.
The story of "Svengali" is dramatic—Barrymore as "Svengali" is a bumptious student of the Latin quarter of Paris and one rather dreaded for he has mastered the art of hypnotism and is willing to use it for diabolical ends. This he does when he finds the young artist model "Trilby", beautiful and to his fancy. She is in love with Billos, played by Fletcher, but Barrymore overpowers her with his vicious art.

Save for the weakness of the minor parts, the story does not let down in dramatic appeal, and Barrymore rises to splendid heights in his interpretation of the rascal "Svengali".
