Purvine, They were a prosperous couple, setting out orchards, raising cattle and farming. Being childless the couple took C. M. Purvine and raised him as their son.

"Clayborne Walker helped to build the first steamboat to ply the Willamette river. He served a term as master of a nearby grange. With his wife he wor-
