Attorneys Disagree—A number of local attorneys yesterday took the position that Secretary of State Hess was incorrect in asserting that the new state traffic code took precedence over municipal ordinances providing for regulation of traffic. The attorneys held the opinion generally that the municipal officers could either prosecute under the state or the city enactments. Since the new state law does not give municipal courts concurrent jurisdiction with circuit courts in enforcing the new laws, several attorneys here expressed the view that the city need not handle its traffic violations under the provisions of the 1931 enactment of the state.

ROCK CRUSHER RUN NEAR END

Marion Plant to Wind up; One at Stayton Will Be Started Soon

Spring run for the Marion rock crusher, in charge of Otto Eaves, will be finished next week, and first rock from the Stayton crusher, operated by G. C. Stayton, will be turned out in another week. Roadmaster Frank Johnson reported yesterday following trip of inspection to both plants.

Repairing of the Stayton crusher will be finished before the end of next week. Gravel from this crusher will be placed on the Fern Ridge market road, three and a half miles of which is now being graded.

Roadmaster Johnson reports that Johnny Griesenauer, foreman in charge of the grading on the Fern Ridge route, is doing an excellent piece of work, and will have all grading finished by the last week in July. First gravel will be placed on this route about June 22.

To Start in July
First work on the roads in the north end of the county will get under way early in July, Mr. Johnson reports for benefit of men in that section who have been seeking work. Early in July the St. Paul paving plant will be in operation to furnish hard stuff for the four miles of market road from Aral to Bressel corners to form connecting point with the Salem-Newberg highway.

Johnson says the court has elected to pave this four mile stretch rather than the seven-mile sector from Aral corner to St. Paul via Fairfield. There is no doubt but that the four mile job will be completed, but it might have been possible to finish the seven-mile route this season.

ANOTHER 'WOXTRY' SCREAMS AT MOTT

Screaming newboys again dispensed scores of extra copies of the Sunday Mercury on downtown Salem streets last night, the latest issue of the paper carrying on the sensational charges against Corporation Commissioner Mott and Jack Callahan, his assistant, made in a paper printed earlier in the week.

Charges that Mott and Callahan are "liars" and "cheats" were made in the paper which bore three headlines ranging from two to four inches in height. The banner line read: "Lies Wreck Financial Institution."

According to the unsigned article appearing in The Mercury, Mott and Callahan had not provided a surety bond May 26 when they took over affairs of the Guardian Savings and Loan association but had actually made out the surety bond June 3, one day after the officers of the corporation asked for a co-suretyship.

The "extra" contends Mott should be removed from office. Mott could not be reached for a statement in Salem late last week.
