## Salem Juniors Beat Silverton 8 to 4 for County Title

Attack Concentrated in two Innings; Vivette Fans Thirteen Batsmen

War clubs of Salem's American (Legion Junior baseball team dominated Saturday's final game for the Marion county championship and eliminated Silverton, runnerup in the statewide competition two years ago and northwest champion last season, from further participation this year, to the ftune of 8 to 4 on the Chemawa

Silverton accumulated almost as many hits as Salem, but the local boys bombarded two pitchers in the second and third innings for seven runs and that was lenough to assure them of victory n the all-important contest, when backed up by Vivette's tight pitching in moments of danger.

Susee, Silverton moundsman who had blanked the Salem team in last Sunday's tight 1 to 0 battle, apparently was not at his best Saturday and in the second inming floundered into trouble.

Vivette walked to start the big inning, Vic DeJardin singled, Ramp drove them in with a threebagger. Coach Downle consulted Susee and on finding that he was not feeling right, sent in Leffler. who was not thoroughly warmed up. Leffler walked Filsinger and then Vern DeJardin scored them both with a single. Three men filed out to end the slaughter. Third is Another

Profitable Inning Vic DeJardin walked to open the festivities in the third. He went on around on singles by Ramp and Filsinger, who in turn scored on a fielder's choice and a bobble at first base which gave Perrine a life. Perrine stole sec-ond and third but died there.

Vivette who totaled 13 strikeouts to his credit, blanked the Silverton team for five innings though two hits were chalked up in the second inning. In the sixth the flasco that caused Salem to lose last Sunday's game was repeated to give Silverton its first score. Bye struck out purposely on a wild pitch, Keber sacrificed him along and Rudishauser drove him in with a single.

Salem added another in the seventh in simple fashion, Vic De-Jardin smashing out a triple past the line of cars in right field and scoring on his brother's single.

In Silverton's half Lovett singled, went to second on an overthrow, and scored on a single by Susee, who was sacrificed to sec-ond by Leffler and came in on De-Jardin's hit. That made three for Silverton and with renewed hopes, the erstwhile champs smacked out two hits in the eighth but they went for naught when Asboe was caught by inches at third.
