

## VAN DUZER IS CHOSEN AGAIN

Head Highway Commission; Pay Reduction Voted At Meeting Here

Iowa highway plants were carried that were needed, indicated he did not favor a state highway shop at Coquille and said he felt that some salary could be taken from the 150 boys using state cars and given to the shoveling laboring men.

The commission discussed thoroughly a \$1,000,000 road program for winter as suggested in a letter received from Governor Julius L. Meier. Commissioner Spaulding said he thought such a program imperative with unemployment bound to be large this winter. Van Duzer concurred. The question of financing such a program was discussed and Van Duzer said he thought temporary borrowings on anticipated revenue for the next fiscal year the only thing possible since all moneys to be received during the current fiscal year have been allotted for projects now under way.

### Votes To Attend Officials' Meeting

The commission agreed to attend the Western State Highway officials meeting in San Francisco July 10 and 11, to confer with federal officials there seeking federal aid on winter work. Thus far the federal road authorities have not approved work done without contract and with hand labor. The bulk of the work planned for this winter will be designed to give as many men employment as possible.

The commission instructed Engineer Klein to prepare estimates of work which could be done this winter with the projects scattered over the state and near centers of population where men out of work would congregate.

Spaulding urged that the widening of the grade through Oregon City be undertaken this winter. He said that traffic was bottled as it went through that city north and south on the Pacific highway.

Spaulding demurred to a penalty recommended on certain contractors for failing to complete their work on time. When informed that the penalty was the extra engineering service furnished by the state during the overtime period, Spaulding still refused to approve the penalty and the matter was referred to him for investigation.

Bids for the 7 1/2 miles of the Harney county section of the Lakeview-Burns highway, as was requested by the Harney county delegation today, will be among the bids called for at the next meeting of the commission. This project is estimated would cost about \$20,000. Bids will also be called for approaches to the new Rogue river bridge in Curry county, which will be completed at the end of this year.

**Governor Calls To Secret Session**  
Governor Julius L. Meier attended the session just before discussion of the reduction in wage and salary schedules, and called the three members into a star chamber session. This meeting lasted for 30 minutes. The purpose of the session was not announced.

Jacobson-Jensen company of Portland was awarded the paving of the Multnomah county-Oregon section of the Pacific highway at \$19,932.50. Seven other bids were received for the mile project.

The Brookfield company of Astoria was awarded the contract for grading and surfacing the Warren-Hug point section of the coast highway at \$19,629. Four bids were received.

Delegations from Harney, Hood River, Jackson, Union, Clatsop, Linn, Coos and Josephine counties were heard by the delegation. Requests for new construction, preliminary surveys and advancing funds for county work were requested and taken under advisement by the commission.

Offing of the 21-mile stretch of the Klamath-Falls Lakeview highway between Beatty and Remont forest boundary, as requested by the Klamath county chamber of commerce, was considered favorably. The project will be attempted at the end of

## PROTEST FILED ON BULL FIGHT

Bloodless Battle Planned For July 4 in Utah Has Opposition

**SALT LAKE CITY, June 25—**(AP)—Bull fighting may be an old Spanish custom, but it has no place in American Fourth of July celebrations, Gov. Geo. H. Dern was told today in telegrams from several parts of the country.

"They asked that he prevent a bull fight—bloodless for both the bulls and the matadors—planned as a feature of a 'Spanish fiesta' scheduled by the American Legion post of Logan, Utah, for Independence day. Men and animals for the affair were to be brought here from Mexico."

Governor Dern advised the humane society to appeal to the county attorney of Cache county, of which Logan is the county seat, for aid in stopping the fight.

**LOGAN, Utah, June 25—**(AP)—Newell Dalnes, county attorney, was out of the city today. He indicated recently however, that he contemplated no legal action to halt the proposed bull fight here July 4.

Sheriff Jess Stowell said today he "expects to be present at the exhibition," and that he knows of no opposition to holding it, as scheduled.

Percy Smith, commander of the Logan American Legion post, and Ariel Bernston, treasurer, were on their way home from Mexico today after having contracted for a troupe of 35 persons, including matadors, to put on the fiesta. They also will bring a number of bulls, it was announced here.

**Foreclosure on Boiler Allowed In Decree Here**  
Foreclosure on a steam boiler situated in the F. W. Foulkes Lumber company sawmill in hills in this county is allowed in decree handed down yesterday in suit of R. B. Hunter vs. F. W. Foulkes.

The decree gives Hunter judgment for five sums ranging from \$228 to \$69.75 and totaling \$801.75, and costs. The judgment is declared first lien against the boiler, and is result of Hunter's attempt to secure payment of liens held by himself and assistants in constructing brick closure for the boiler.

## LINEN COMPANY TO BE FORMED

Organization to Take Place In Portland Saturday Veatch Announces

weaving machines to supplement and eventually replace the weaving machinery now in use at the plant of the Salem Linen Mills.

At the present time 24 people are working at the Salem Linen Mills and by the time the new operations are on in full swing 60 people will be employed. When weaving is being done Gilbraith expects 100 people will be at work there.

The reorganization of the Oregon Linen Mill company represents months of concerted effort by John B. Meek of Portland and J. F. Gilbraith of Salem. The two men secured the financial assistance of a number of large Portland business men including such leaders as Governor Julius L. Meier.

**Preferred Stock Is Transferred**  
They were able to secure a transfer of the preferred stock of the Oregon Linen Mill company from old stockholders in a ratio of one share of stock in the new Salem Linen Mills company for four of the preferred stock in the old company.

The new company in turn sold 2000 shares of its stock for \$80,000 and with this to provide working capital, together with money for such additional capital investments in machinery as are needed. These 2000 shares to

gether with 1000 shares issued to the organizers and another 1000 shares traded to preferred stockholders in the old mill, represent the outstanding shares of capital stock in the Salem Linen Mills. Two thousand additional shares are available for issuance, 1000 as bonuses to the management and 1000 for sale for additional capital if it becomes needed. The \$150,000 outstanding bond issue due in 1947 is the only funded debt of the company.
