Loss to Etterburg strawberry growers was heavy due to continued rain during the past week. Late cherries may be damaged if the rain continues and in many places the growers lost as high as

90 per cent of the Royal Ann and black cherry crop. Prunes which promise to be a good crop this year are being benefitted by the rain and growers are hopeful of a fair market.

Hops are continually threatened by downy mildew which is made much worse by cool damp weather. Growers report that damage has not been extensive so far but that the mildew has appeared in several yards.
